**One-Armed Football Player.**

ATHENS, Ga., Dec. 17.—The State Normal School here is probably the only school in the United States boasting a one-armed football player. For three years W. P. White, an Atlanta boy, has played quarterback on that team, and for two years has been its captain. In spite of his infirmity, White is some football player, and compares creditably with many a college performer less afflicted than he.

White is 19 years old. He lost his arm while hunting by dropping his gun, which was discharged. He entered the Normal School in 1907, and straightway made good, and for two years captained that plucky aggregation. He graduates from the school in June, 1911, and expects to enter the University of Georgia afterward to study law.

White is quick and accurate in handling the spheroid. In two games he has not made a fumble in receiving or passing the ball. As a ground-gainer he is fast and handy, quick and sure in an opportunity. He was responsible for much of the scoring when the Normal team won the Athens game last week, and by recovering punts he is also on the job, and makes good returns every time.

**JUDGE ROASTS JURY**

Says Evidence Against Herbert Hood Was Complete.

"I don't know how you can come to that conclusion, gentlemen, upon the evidence," said Judge Winchester to the jury of the sessions after they had returned a verdict of not guilty in the trial of Herbert Hood, charged with stealing fares from the Toronto Street Railway Company.

"No use having detectives," he continued, "if they are not to be believed. The evidence could not be supported by better testimony than what they gave. You are the judges. It is your responsibility, not mine. If you are going to be robbed and thieves take possession of your goods, you will want the assistance of men who can protect them."

Turning to the prisoner his honor said: "You are discharged. You know what you have stated in the witness box, whether it is true or not. You are not punished by this court, yet you may be by some other."

At the last sessions Hood was tried on the same charge, but the jury in that case disagreed. All the evidence
