Graduates are qualified to enter the Imperial or Canadian Services and shipsman. NO INTENTION TO SELL WEST INDIES TO U. S.

London, March 8.—Premier Lloyd George, replying to questions in the House of Commons today, regarding the suggestion that the West Indies be transferred to the United States in payment of part of the British debt, declared that there was not the slightest intention on the part of the British government to barter or sell any part of the British West Indies.

The premier declared that the inhabitants of the West Indies were loyally attached to the crown and intensely proud of their membership in the empire.

C.P.R. Pays Fifteen Million For New Equipment

Montreal, March 8.—The C.P.R. has given out equipment orders totaling, roughly, \$15,000,000.

These orders call for: Freight equipment, 2000 40-ton cars; 500 refrigerators, 500 automobile equipment, 87 ore cars, passenger equipment, 12 dining cars, 53 sleepers, 13 compartment cars, 24 baggage cars.

The company will be able to execute a considerable portion of the orders while the Canadian Car & Foundry Co. limited, will get a large part of the total.

New Capital Issues of Britain Total 78,000,000 Pounds

London, March 8.—(By the Canadian Press)—According to a reliable return the new capital issues of the United Kingdom for January and February totaled seventy-eight million pounds compared with twenty-eight millions in 1919. A large majority of these issues were for developing existing home industries or for financing new ventures, which are mostly oversubscribed.

KING RECEIVES GEDDES.

London, March 8.—King George, formally received Sir Auckland Geddes as ambassador from the United States, a customary procedure when a new ambassador is named.

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PERSIA DESIRES WAR REPARATION

Wants Also Rectification of Frontier and Some Adjustments of Territory.

London, March 8.—Persia's case has been laid before the supreme allied council by the Persian foreign minister, who is visiting this city, according to the London Times. It is believed the situation so far as it relates to the Turkish question, has already been discussed by the allied premiers.

Persia desires reparation for the losses she suffered during the war from Turkey and urges rectification of her frontier, and some territorial adjustments necessary to end the long-standing differences between her and Turkey, especially regarding Azerbaijan, the newspaper says. Although the Persian government is anxious for the establishment of cordial relations with Turkey, the sentiments of other branches of the Moslem faith respecting the sultan's position as supreme caliph is not shared by the Persians, who believe in the Shah's call following the death of the prophet of Mohammed, and by the Shiites of the Caucasus, India and other Moslem countries.

BOLSHEVIK REGULARS NOW HOLD IRKUTSK

London, March 8.—Irkutsk, the recent seat of the Kolchak government, which was seized last month by revolutionary troops who were reported to have executed Admiral Kolchak, is now in the hands of Bolshevik regulars, troops of the Red army having entered the town, it is announced in a wireless message from Moscow. Several members of the former Kolchak ministry and many active counter-revolutionists who were imprisoned in Irkutsk are being transferred to Omsk, where they will be delivered to the judgment of a revolutionary tribunal, the dispatch adds.

JAPAN DENIES BUYING VICTORY OVER RUSSIA

London, March 8.—The Japanese embassy here today issued the following statement: "Referring to the news circulated in the last few days, to the effect that Japan bought the victory over Russia in 1904-05, the Japanese embassy declares this is entirely groundless. Moreover, we suspect there is some foul play involved in the rumor. The story of course, is a preposterous and chimerical that it deserves a formal denial; but in view of the fact that several papers printed it, it is well that it should be noticed."

Export Russian Wheat Totals Million and a Half Tons

Rome, March 8.—Data secured by the International Institute of Agriculture here, on conditions in the chief cereal producing provinces of South Russia, which in normal times provided the grain supplies of northern Russia, furnish the basis for an estimate that the quantity of wheat available for export from South Russia in the season 1919-20 should reach at least 1,500,000 tons.

The bulletin goes into details regarding the Kuban district, the government of which, it says, has calculated that from the crops of 1919 alone there should be available for export in the present season about 450,000 tons of wheat and 370,000 tons of barley, remaining from the previous Kuban crops. The figures for other provinces—the Ukraine, Terek and Don—were provided, it is stated, by the British consular agents.

Form Vancouver Island Co. To Carry on a Whaling Venture

Victoria, B.C., March 8.—(By Canadian Press).—With a capital of \$600,000, the Vancouver Island Whaling Company has been formed to carry on whaling on the British Columbia coast, and to manufacture fertilizer from fish offal. Returned soldiers will be employed wherever possible. Headquarters will be in this city, and a plant established on Barkley Sound. Whaling has been secured on steel summer.

Head of Canadian Air Board Guest of Aircraft Makers

New York, March 8.—Col. O. M. Biggar, chief of the Canadian Air Board, was a guest of the Manufacturers' Aircraft Association at the aeronautical exposition today.

HONDURAN REBELS DISPERSED

San Salvador, Republic of Salvador, March 8.—A dispatch from Tegucigalpa says that the Honduran revolutionary forces have been dispersed, and have fled into Nicaragua, the government of Honduras has set at liberty all political prisoners.

QUIET ELECTIONS IN ARGENTINA

Buenos Aires, March 8.—In marked contrast to the disturbances prevailing during the congressional electoral campaign, the elections themselves passed off yesterday with perfect tranquillity.

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SON OF HALL CAINE NOW IN AMERICA

On Mission to Buy Wood Pulp for Seven Leading British Newspapers.

St. John, N.B., March 8.—G. R. Hall Caine, of London, England, son of Sir Hall Caine, arrived on the steamer Empress of France, He is in Canada in the interests of a group of seven of the largest newspapers in England, and is here to obtain a supply of wood pulp for the English newspapers.

He said it is his intention to obtain, if possible, a block of properties for the cutting of wood pulp, and also to arrange for the purchase of wood pulp for shipment to England, where it will be manufactured.

He will proceed to New York tonight and will then go to Montreal and from there to Ottawa, where he will confer with members of the government regarding his business.

ARE SOWING COTTON AND REDUCING FOOD

Crisis in Egypt is Due Mainly to the Landowners and Landowning Peasantry.

London, March 8.—The food crisis in Egypt is due mainly to land owners, including the land owning peasantry, increasing the area planted in cotton so as to take advantage of the soaring prices of cotton, according to The Daily Mail's Cairo correspondent. "Wheat and other cereals actually have been ploughed up in order to sow cotton," the correspondent continues, "and the view of the present shortage of cereals there is a greater danger of the famine people being driven to eating grass." The miners' delegates, deciding that the increase in wages recently granted was insufficient, voted in favor of a strike, 160 to 14.

New Street Car Extension Is Planned in Brantford

Brantford, Ont., March 8.—(Special).—The street railway commissioners are planning to extend the Holmedale line up St. Paul's avenue to Brantford. The industrial section of the city, constantly expanding, needs a crush at work hours and this would give the city a new outlet. Further extension to Terrace will have been called off as the city has decided to go ahead with the St. Paul's avenue extension this year.
