# DEATH AND FAMINE **PURSUE REFUGEES**

Eight Hundred on Vessel Meet Storms, Starvation and Disease.

Constantinople, March 8.—Cheated of his prey at Novorossisk, death pursued 800 refugees who had fled from that city on board the steamer Navajo at the approach of Russian soviet forces, and assumed the dread forms of disease and shipwreck, cold and starvation. It was only after a heroic struggle with the elements that the staunch craft arrived here with its cargo of emaciated and starving passengers.

Eighteen hours after the Navajo had left port, the vessel, which had been chartered by the American Red Cross to bring the fugitives out of southern Russia was struck by a blizzard, which for two days buffeted the ship and prevented it making hardly any headway. The ship was short of provins and fuel, and in the midst of the storm it was found there was no food on board, and that the bunkers were empty. Then, for four days, the Navajo drifted helplessly, a mere dere-lict, in the middle of the Black Sea,

while the hurricane raged. Typhus appeared on board, and, lacking facilities for fighting the scourge, the refugees saw the bodies of scores of their shipmates consigned to the waters. Others, weakened by cold and privations before they came on board, succumbed to their sufferings. At last another refugee ship picked up the Navajo and managed to get a hawser aboard. She was then towed toward the Bosphorus. Hundreds of the passengers arrived here with their hands and feet frozen.
