minister and the government has never been on top of the employment situation in the mining industry of this country; and in view of the fact that Falconbridge Nickel Mines has announced already hundreds of lay-offs, and hundreds more are going to be made, can the minister tell the House if he intends to meet with the boards of directors of Falconbridge Nickel Mines and the other mining companies that are threatening lay-offs in order to discuss that situation?

Hon. Alastair Gillespie (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, already I have met with the chief executive officers of INCO. I have also been in touch with the chief executive officer of Falconbridge. There may well be further meetings with respect to these companies and others. A number of mining companies have been to Sudbury trying to recruit miners for their operations across the country. They have not yet been successful in being able to recruit very many. This seems to support the contention of my colleague who has just answered questions on this particular point. I can assure the hon. member, if there are miners in the Sudbury area looking for employment with Eldorado or with some of the other significant mining corporations, that there are openings available.

PROPOSED IMPOSITION OF TARIFF ON IMPORTED NICKEL CARBONATE AND FLUORSPAR

Mr. John Rodriguez (Nickel Belt): Mr. Speaker, the mining companies which have gone into Sudbury looking for employees have asked for three years of experience, and the lay-off date is two years, 161 days. Therefore, the minister's reply is full of baloney. I want to direct my supplementary question to the Minister of Finance. In view of the fact that a certain amount of unemployment in this country is due to decisions by corporations to purchase minerals abroad which could be mined in Canada, such as the decision by Alcan to close down their fluorspar mine in St. Lawrence and the action of Sherritt Gordon in importing nickel carbonate for the Saskatchewan plant, can the minister tell the House if he is now considering placing a temporary tariff on the import of fluorspar or nickel carbonate, possibly in the neighbourhood of the 13 per cent Japanese tariff against imported nickel?

REQUEST FOR PROGRESS REPORT FOLLOWING SIGNING OF HIGHWAY AGREEMENT WITH OUEBEC

Mr. Gérard Laprise (Abitibi): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion. On June 22, 1977 the minister announced the signature of an agreement with a minister of the Quebec government dealing mostly with forestry development and some road systems in Quebec involving \$440 million. Could the minister tell the House if following that agreement there have been other new developments or whether only that agreement dealing mainly with road construction was signed?

Hon. Marcel Lessard (Minister of Regional Economic Expansion): Mr. Speaker, some steps were taken since the signature of the agreement. Some contracts were awarded by the provincial government responsible for carrying out the agreement as such for highways, access roads in forest areas and reforestation. In those three areas, agreements have been signed. Action is under way, jobs have been created and others will be created in the next few months.

POSSIBILITY POLITICAL EMBARRASSMENT RESULT OF ENFORCEMENT OF SAFETY REGULATIONS—REQUEST FOR TABLING OF REPORT
