**NEW ITALIAN PREMIER**

Rome, Oct. 28—Reports that Professor Vittorio Orlando, minister of the interior in the retiring Boselli cabinet, has been requested to form a new ministry, are confirmed by the Messaggero. This newspaper says Professor Orlando will make only a few changes at present in the general composition of the ministry as it was constituted under Premier Boselli.

### War Menus

How to Save Wheat, Beef and Bacon for the men at the front. Issued from the Office of the Food Controller for Canada.

**MENU FOR TUESDAY**

**Breakfast**  
Creamed Toast Fried Cornmeal Mush  
Milk Sugar Tea or Coffee

**Luncheon**  
Sliced Tomatoes Fried Potatoes  
War Bread Plum Preserve

**Dinner**  
Baked Heart of Peef, Potatoes, Turnips  
Tea Biscuits Baked Apple

The recipes for war bread and Baked Heart of Peef, mentioned above, are as follows:

**War Bread**—2 cups boiling water, 1-3 cup molasses, 1/2 tablespoon salt, 1 tablespoon dripping, 1/2 yeast cake dissolved in 1/2 cup lukewarm water, 1 cup rolled oats or oatmeal, 4 1/2 cups flour. Add boiling water to oats and let stand one hour. Add molasses, salt, butter, dissolved yeast cake and flour. Let rise, beat thoroughly, turn into buttered bread pans, let rise again and bake.

**Baked Heart of Peef**—Wash a beef heart, remove veins, arteries, and clot blood. Stuff with a dressing made as for fowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Put in a covered baker with two cups boiling water and bake slowly two hours, basting every fifteen minutes.

### Saving Substitutes

Canadian Food Controller's Suggestions of War-time Dishes For Tomorrow

Beans are as good as meat for body-building. They are high in protein.

**Cream of Lima Bean Soup**  
1 cup dried lima beans; 3 pints cold water; 2 slices onion; 4 slices carrot; 1 cup cream or milk; 4 tablespoons butter; 2 tablespoons flour; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Soak beans overnight; in the morning drain and add cold water; cook until soft and rub through a sieve. Cut vegetables in small cubes, and cook five minutes in half the butter; remove vegetables, add flour, salt and pepper and stir into boiling soup. Add cream, re-heat, strain and add remaining butter in small pieces.

Save bread by making palatable substitutes like bean gems.

**Bean Gems**  
White flour, 1 cup; bran flour, 1 cup; milk, 1 cup; eggs, 1; sugar, 4 tablespoons; melted butter, 1 tablespoon; salt, 1 teaspoon; baking powder, 4 teaspoons. Mix and sift the dry ingredients. Add the milk and eggs. Then melted dripping. Bake in a hot oven in buttered gem pans.

### RECENT DEATHS

**S. L. T. Frost.**

The death of S. L. T. Frost, of Ottawa, which occurred on Sunday, the 28th instant, after a brief illness, is a startling news and a great shock to his many friends all over the country. He was the third son of the late Samuel E. and Maria Frost, of Lower Norton, Kings county. He was greatly interested in anything that pertained to the uplifting of the young men in the community in which he lived. He took a great interest in the Y.M.C.A. and other organizations which had for their objective the betterment of the youth, and many young men who survive him owe their success in life to the magnetic influence of the departed. Mr. Frost entered the customs department of the civil service in 1886 and advanced step by step until at the time of his death he was the chief accountant of the customs department at Ottawa. Mr. Frost is survived by his wife, one son, Lorne, and one daughter, Marjorie, all of Ottawa.

**Capt. W. D. McIntyre.**

Death came suddenly to Captain William Duncan McIntyre at his home, 110 Adelaide street, Saturday evening. Although he was seventy-two years of age

and had not been well for several months, he was about the house on Saturday as usual, and only a moment before the end he was laughing as he talked with Mrs. McIntyre who sat near the couch on which he was reclining. Before she realized what had happened he had passed away. His death came as a stunning blow to his family and a wide circle of friends.

Captain McIntyre was one of the best known men in the city. For thirty-five years he followed the sea and was in command of vessels whose names were very familiar in Atlantic coast ports. These included the Elizabeth D. Hart, the Sealing, the Ada G. Shortland, and others. The latter, a schooner, was owned by him. When he sold her he retired from the sea and was for ten years a clerk at the St. John police court. He held this position until three and a half years ago, when he retired to spend the evening of a long and active life quietly with his family in the North End.

He was born in Kars, Kings county, his parents being John and Sarah McIntyre. His father was a native of Glasgow. Besides his wife, formerly Miss Julia Jones of this city, he leaves to mourn, a daughter, Miss Ada McIntyre, at home, and a son, Fred. McIntyre, of West Somerville (Mass.). Mrs. John McIntyre of West Somerville, is his stepmother. Captain A. A. McIntyre, of Cranston avenue, is a brother and Burpee McIntyre, of West Somerville, a half-brother. In religion Captain McIntyre was a Baptist. The funeral is to be tomorrow afternoon, at 2.30 o'clock from his late residence in Adelaide street.

The sympathy of a wide circle of friends will be tendered the family in its bereavement.

**Capt. Fred. L. Robinson.**

The many friends of Capt. Fred L. Robinson will learn with regret of his death which occurred at the General Public Hospital, Saturday, October 27, after a few days' illness with pneumonia. Capt. Robinson was formerly a resident of St. John, and a few years ago he removed to Gagetown, where his family now resides. He was well and favorably known. Of a genial and kindly disposition, he not only won for himself friends in shipping circles, but with all whom he came in contact. He was ready to sail for New York from Two Rivers (N. S.), in his vessel, Emily F. Northam, when seized with what proved to be his last illness. His wife, one son and seven daughters are left to mourn a loving husband and father, besides his mother, four brothers and two sisters—Henry, of Brydon street; Charles, of 318 Duke street, West End; Robert, 107 Victoria street; Odier, of Chelmsford (Mass.); Mrs. C. D. Wasson, 122 Victoria street, and Mrs. E. MacLean, 73 Victoria street. The funeral services were conducted at the home of his brother Robert, Sunday evening by Rev. Neil McLaughlin, followed by a short service by the L.O.O.F. of which he was a member. Interment at Gagetown on Tuesday.

**Mrs. M. Wellington Cox.**

Word was received here of the death of Mrs. M. W. Cox, which occurred yesterday at her home, White's Cove, Kings county. Besides her husband she leaves to mourn one son, P. W. Cox, now residing in the United States, and daughter Mrs. T. E. Robinson of this city. The deceased was a daughter of the late S. V. White and for some years was a resident of this city.

W. R. Payne, who for thirty-nine years has been in the employ of the C. G. R., died at Moncton yesterday afternoon after a short period of illness at the age

of sixty-seven years, leaving his widow, three sons and one daughter.

Miss Amelia Lawlor, aged twenty-nine years, passed away at her home in Point LaNim, Restigouche, on Tuesday, October 28, leaving her mother, two brothers and three sisters.
