GAVE POISON TO BABES; TOOK DOSE HERSELF
Murder Indictment Coming Against Woman Who Left Husband For Another Man
New York, Jan. 11.—District Attorney Martin of Bronx county, announced last night that he will go before the grand jury today with a demand for an indictment of murder against Mrs. Ida Sniffen Walters, who called herself Mrs. Rogers after leaving her husband for Loris Boland, a Park Row lawyer, and who gave poison to their eight months' old daughter Loris and their two and a half year old son, John.
Mrs. Walters is in a private room in Lebonon Hospital pending complete recovery from poison which she swallowed after giving doses of it to her babes.

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USE THE WANT AD WAY
Direct Line Before Long Between St. John and Havana
Cuban Consul Pleased With Developments of Last Two Months
"Before long we will have a greatly increased trade and a direct line of steamers running between St. John and Havana, if the progress made in the last two months is maintained," said Cesar Barranco, Cuban consul, this morning when interviewed as to the prospects for increased business with his country.
"The letters which I sent out early in December asking for co-operation of provincial shippers in routing their exportations through St. John and which your paper was kind enough to publish have brought a very hearty response, both from merchants already engaged in the Cuban trade and from new firms seeking a market. Among the articles on the list mentioned are potatoes, fish and box shooks and one of these came from a Prince Edward Island man who undertook to transfer his business from Halifax to St. John.
"The policy given my efforts has even attracted a New York shipping firm which has promised to supply steamers whenever the opportunity arises."
"There has already been an eight increase in the trade although time is yet able to secure the direct service. Your potatoes here are superior to any of the American potatoes and should be in great demand in Cuba.
"Your business men will be interested to know that my government is establishing in Havana a commercial museum where samples of natural and manufactured products from all countries with which Cuba is interested from a trade standpoint will be shown and I would like to see a comprehensive collection of your products sent down for this museum as it will be visited continually by merchants from all over Cuba."
