Letters From France

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Gray, Erie street, Driver Andrew Gibson tells of some interesting experiences near the fighting line in France, where he is with the first contingent, in the ammunition column. He says he is well and able to be remembered to his friends about the city. He acknowledges with thanks receipt of parcels from his home and other friends, particularly tobacco which, he says, was greatly appreciated.

A letter from Corp. Walter Wilson, received by his brother, Thomas Wilson, of North End, says that he has been placed in charge of a squad of German prisoners taken recently in battle. He says he is well and came through recent fighting unscathed.

Miss Ethel Kennedy, of 106 Brussels street, has received a chatty letter from her cousin, John Sullivan, now serving in France with an ambulance unit. He speaks of having been in the midst of battle picking up wounded and bringing them to the rear to the ambulance in which they were taken further back to the hospital. He said he had seen some exciting moments, among others of the latest being a battle between a German and a British airplane. So far this company had not lost a man, although powerful machine guns had swept the road over which they passed, and at night the Germans had played strong search-lights on them as they made their way to the dressing stations. German air-machines dropped bombs upon their billet, but did very little damage, except in one instance where their bombs had wounded a man very badly.

Driver Nash at Tidworth.

Driver T. Nash wrote from Tidworth, Eng., on April 18 to say that he was well and having a good time, and wished to be remembered to all his St. John friends. The only incident noted in the letter was the runaway of his team one day, when he had a rather narrow escape from injury.

Letter from Capt. Currie.

Capt. V. G. Currie of Amherst writing from France on April 6 said:—

"We have been resting here for a week or ten days and more at six a.m. tomorrow to a new field further north. We have been marching and trench digging around here about six hours a day. This place is called Estaires and it is not far from Neuve Chapelle. We have fifteen miles to march tomorrow and will be somewhere north of Hazebrouck and about twenty miles from the firing line, the furthest away from it we have been since we landed. Our total casualties to date are ten killed and about twenty-five wounded. Officers have all escaped so far. I had a party of 200 men digging trenches 400 yards behind the British firing line the other night. We had some narrow escapes as the bullets were dropping very thickly in our vicinity. We dug from eleven thirty p.m. till three a.m. and we weren't sorry to go. Three bombs dropped near our billet the other morning by a German plane. Broke a lot of windows but didn't kill anybody."

Oppose Election.
