A Strike Lacking Strategy. (New York Herald-Tribune.)

The public can afford to remain quict. The situation is uncomplicate, by the bituminous and railroad strike which in previous years have aggra-vated anthracite stoppages; there are large stocks on hand, and there is a much wider knowledge than ever be-fore of the advantages of bituminous, coke and oil as substitutes. The pub-lic can afford to remain caim and allow the anthracite industry to work out its own economic salvation. Anthracite is not a necessity of life. Although the exportation is tow, all but 5 per cent. of the world's anthracite comes from Pennsylvania, which means that most of the world gets along without it, and that the Northeastern States can do so as well. There is a limit beyond which it will not pay either miners or operators to raise the prices. What is, happening is that the af-thracite industry is finding its proper economic level; but it is doing it in a regrettably uncomosine fashion. That is the industry's confession of failure. 
