MAN HAS CHOICE OF TWO BURDENS

Dr. Campbell Morgan Contrasts Doing Will of God With Selfishness.

Calling upon all men to look earnestly at themselves and discover if self was not their ruling passion, Rev. Dr. Campbell Morgan, in his address in Centenary church last night, gave the first of three evening addresses on the last four verses of the eleventh chapter of Matthew. He declared that a choice of two burdens lay before every one, a choice of doing God's will and bearing a light burden and of doing the will of self and carrying a heavy burden. Large congregations attended both meetings yesterday.

In the evening Dr. Morgan told of the financial support given to the mission to date explaining that a budget was prepared for the whole of his tour and the expenses had been apportioned according to the ability of a community to raise the money. He said that before last night's meeting there had been contributed \$370 and there was still \$850 required to be raised in St. John. He hoped it would be his joy again this year as it had been on his previous visit to find that from the collections taken there was enough money to give a substantial sum to the orphanages.

He said that it was never his custom to answer in the meetings questions sent to him but that he had received an anonymous letter which he could not answer in any other way. The writer asked if it would be right to do certain things and Dr. Morgan wished to reply that no man could tell another what would be right for him to do. Dr. Morgan recommended his inquirer to take the matter to God in prayer and to have nothing to do with any practices which in his own mind he held in doubt.

BOY SACRIFICES HIS LIFE FOR DOG

Youngster, Fearing for Animal's Life, Jumps Into Canal After It.

New York, Sept. 30.—Charles Evans, 11 years old, of Brooklyn, lost his life in a vain attempt to save his pet dog from drowning in the Gowanus Canal.

With a companion, Mateo Giordano, the lad had been playing near the canal at the foot of Bond street. The boys were throwing stones in the water, and the dog, a collie, jumped in in an effort to retrieve one. Fearing that the dog would be unable to return to the bank, young Evans jumped in after

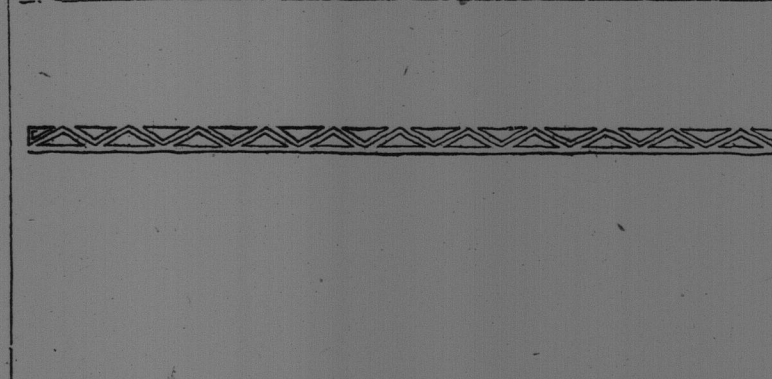
the animal and succeeded in getting his arms around its neck. Then he sank. Mateo screamed for help, and Policeman Cornelius Donahue tried to rescue the boy and dog. His efforts were fruitless, and it was not till an hour later that the boy's body, with his arms still encircling the dog's neck, was recovered with grappling irons.

The boy was one of seven children,

and when his mother was informed of the tragedy she collapsed.

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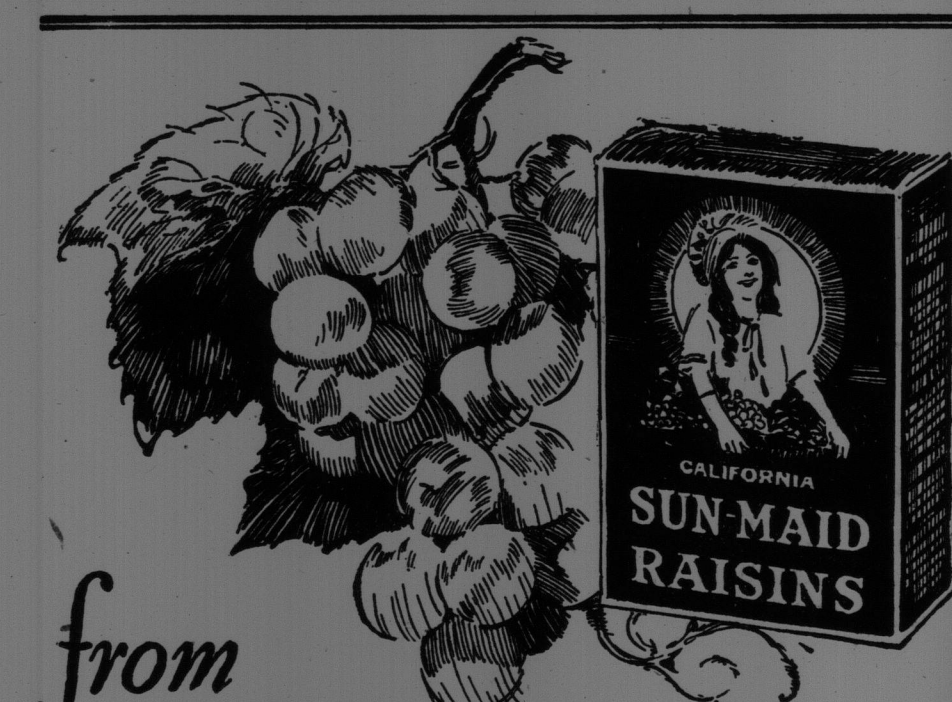
