
ATHLETICS FOR GIRLS. Two Opposing Views Are Aired in Eng

Athletics for school girls are opposed by many English educators, who maintain that the present system of physical training has a bad effect on future generations. One principal declares that eighty per tent. of the girls she had known who had been trained to be teachers of physical training had been incapacitated for motherhood. Strong chests and big muscles lack elasticity, according to the director of a school for physical development.
