BOWLING.

GIBBONS IN DRAW.

Newark, N. J., Dec. 1.—Getting into his stride after seven rounds in which he had the worst of it, Phil Krug, of Harrison (N. J.), tonight fought Mike Gibbons, of St. Paul, to a fast twelve-round draw. They weighed in at 185 and 155 lbs., respectively. Immediately after the bout Gibbons and his manager left for St. Louis, where he is to meet Augie Ratner on Monday.

ATHLETICS FOR GIRLS.

Two Opposing Views Are Aired in England.

Athletics for school girls are opposed by many English educators, who maintain that the present system of physical training has a bad effect on future generations. One principal declares that eighty per cent. of the girls she had known who had been trained to be teachers of physical training had been incapacitated for motherhood. Strong chests and big muscles lack elasticity, according to the director of a school for physical development.

Tough sports such as hockey and football are particularly condemned, and it is argued that natural weakness cannot be overcome by acquired strength. The physical exercise is favored by these teachers. One principal maintains that the feet are the only part of the body that should be made strong. Athletic women produce female offspring only, says one woman doctor, and seldom have sons. A campaign has been started to circulate these ideas.

On the other hand, at the annual conference of Head Mistresses of Secondary Schools, held recently at Manchester, every speaker on the subject endorsed the modern custom of organized games.

RAILROADS SAVE FIFTY MILLIONS

Chicago, Dec. 1.—New rules, demanded by the railroads, authorized by the railway labor board and opposed by the unions were put into operation today when 400,000 railroad shop employees in the United States started to work.

The railroads will be saved approximately \$50,000,000 by the adoption of the new system.

C. P. R. PLANS FOR ATLANTIC SERVICES

Montreal, Dec. 2.—The steamships Empress of France and Empress of Scotland (25,000 tons, new) will next summer establish a new service between Quebec, Havre and Southampton, according to announcement by the C. P. R. Steamships, Limited. The Empress of Britain will maintain the usual Quebec-Liverpool service.

Three new steamers, the Montserrat, Montserrat and Montserrat, 16,000 tons each, will be placed on the Montreal-Liverpool run next summer.

Princess's Bridal Gift for Hospitals

According to a cable despatch received from London, the Daily Mirror is promoting a wedding present to Princess Mary among its readers. In answer to a request from the editor to know what form the present should take, the Princess said that she would like a check to be handed to her on her wedding day so that she could present it to the Great Ormond street and Victoria Hospitals for children in which she had been interested for a long time past.
