Charleston, W. Va., Jan. 24.—Forty-five years ago, when Thomas McWard still had faith in Santa Claus, his mother warned him that his temper would one day endanger his happiness. Some days life at home with little "Tommy" was nearly unbearable and his mother, fearing that some ailment might be responsible for the sudden outbursts of rage, called a physician. It was the last physician "Thomas ever spoke to. He had "Tommy" stick out his tongue and left some medicine that caused the worst tantrum that the little man had ever had.

As the years flowed on "Tommy" grew a large, wholly successful corn on the little toe of his left foot. It was high and so situated that passersby might kick it, and to their embarrassment and to the ever growing rage of Mr. McWard they frequently did.

THE MYSTERIES OF THE EEL
Washington Scientist Takes Up Study of Fish That Never Eats

Washington, D. C., Jan. 24.—Hugh M. Smith, commissioner of fish and fisheries, is investigating the eel. This fish, since the time of Aristotle, inspired strange theories of ancient writers and extravagant hypotheses of modern scientists.

"When the complete life of the eel is cleared up," Mr. Smith said in an article just written for the National Geographical Society. "it will doubtless be shown to have a more remarkable history than any other fish possesses."

Mr. Smith says that in the fall the eels that have been living in fresh water undergo peculiar changes. The eyes of the males become nearly twice their normal size, and both sexes lose their dirty yellow green color and become silvery. They travel toward the sea, mostly at night, and become lost. How they live there is still a mystery.

One of the strangest facts about the eel, he says, is that it takes no food. From 5,000,000 to 10,000,000 eggs are produced by average eels, he says, and both sexes die after spawning once.

BRYAN SAYS STATES ENTERING IDEALISTIC ERA
Washington, Jan. 24.—The United States is entering upon an era of idealism, in the opinion of Secretary Bryan, principal speaker at a Democratic dinner here. He declared that the commercial ideal has for years been dominant in this country, but that under the leadership of President Wilson a change is coming. He said that the country is entering upon a new age of ideals.

"The people are demanding that this country should no longer be used as a tool for the interests," he said. "No man ever took up his difficult task with as brave a heart or has pursued it with more tenacity than has the president."

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The Defeat of Johnny Summers

Milwaukee, Jan. 22.—Our "British cousins cannot boast of many high class fighters just now and therefore it is all the more surprising that a championship bout between two of their stars should be held in a foreign country, or at least a far away colonial possession.

Johnny Summers was the recognized welterweight champion of Great Britain and Tom McCormick was considered the best of the challengers for the title.

They had been dickered in England about the match, but finally Johnny went to Australia under contract to Snowy Baker for a series of matches and later McCormick followed him to the land of the kangaroo.

They were matched for the title at the famous stadium in Sydney and McCormick won after twenty rounds of hard fighting.

Johnny is getting into the veteran class and McCormick, who is conceded to be a clever fighter, had the advantage with youth and strength on his side. Had Ray Bronson defeated the Danish champion, Waldemar Holberg, there would have been a chance for a real international title match, and there may be before Bronson returns home, as he is after a return bout with the Dane and expects to reverse the decision against him.

However, they will find another hard one after them for the welter weight crown, a Philadelphia boy, formerly of Brooklyn and Cleveland. Graves has been putting up some great battles and has issued a challenge to either McCormick or Mike Gibbons at 145 ringside or 142 at three o'clock, for the championship, the distance to be ten or twenty rounds.

Trouble in Federal Camp.

The action of Killefer in jumping the Federal contract marks the beginning of the end of the negotiations between the Phillies and the Federal League. Killefer, the Phillie Phanatic, who already has signed with the Federals, also jumped back, Killefer, acting as his agent.

Big League Notes.
Joe Lake, a Detroit pitcher, was reported to have signed with the Baltimore Federals. Now comes a statement by Killefer that he has had dealings with Lake and does not want him.

Toots Schulz, a former University of Pennsylvania and Philadelphia National League pitcher, has been signed by Hugh Jennings for the Tigers. Schulz after a long rest thinks he can show old time form in the box.

Joe Mandot, of New Orleans, outfought and outboxed Johnny Lore, of New York, in every round of their ten-round contest except the second, in which the local boy did the better work. Mandot weighed 135 pounds, three pounds lighter than Lore.

SEARCH HOME OF TOBACCO CONCERN
Dresden, Jan. 24.—A search of the premises and archives of the chief German cigarette concern which is affiliated to the American Tobacco Trust has been in progress under a search warrant.
The proceedings are apparently connected with a movement against the interest of Germany by the trust, recently the subject of an interpellation in the imperial parliament.
The direct cause of the search was the lodging of a complaint under the law prohibiting secret associations, which hitherto has been applied only in political cases.
