RECRUITING AT LAST ARE HERE

At last the word has gone out to re-

At last the word has gone out to recruit in New Brunswick. The unit will be known as the 26th Battalion. In order to facilitate the work of mobilization five recruiting officers have been appointed for the province under Col. J. L. McAvity, who is to command the regiment when formed.

These officers will begin active recruiting at once and have authority to sign on men for infantry duty under pay. Col. B. R. Armstrong, when seen today said that he had received instructions from Halifax to proceed with the recruiting at St. John for the second contingent taking the volunteers on the strength and on pay immediately. The men for the infantry are to be recruited first. Enrolling for the artillery, army service and army medical corps will not be commenced for some days. The other officers who have been appointed in the province are Col. J. J. Irvine, at Chatham; Col. Maltby, at Newcastle, Major W. H. Grey at Fredericton, and Capt. A. E. G. McKenzie at Campbellton. Dr. S. S. Skinner will be the examining officer in St. John. The officers appointed will have certain districts to cover in their recruiting activities, and the men signed on will be sent to St. John, which will be the recruiting centre for the battalion.


