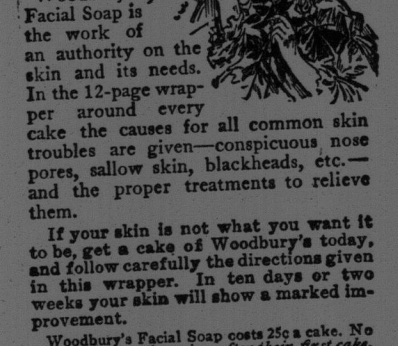

Sunbury—James Goan, Henry Wilnot, Murray D. Patterson, William K. Fletcher, Emory C. Montford and George Duguay, to be justices of the peace.
Carleton—Douglas W. C. Stevens, of the town of Woodville, to be an issuer of marriage licenses.
Charlotte—Wm. R. Mitchell, to be a stipendiary or police magistrate for the parish of Dumbarton, and Henry Emerson and Wm. H. Langhin, M. D., to be justices of the peace.
Madawaska—Charles L. Cyr, to be a justice of the peace.
Restigouche—Robert B. McBeath, to be a member of the board of school trustees for the town of Campbellton, in the place of D. D. Stewart, resigned, and Ben Windsor, to be an issuer of marriage licenses at New Mills.
Queens—George A. Miller, of Newcastle Bridge, to be a provincial constable.

BRIDGETOWN NOTES

Bridgetown, N. S., March 26—Miss Bertha Whitman, the owner of a large sugar ranch, has begun the season's work. She supervises the business, and the product cannot be excelled in purity and manner of packing.
Rev. N. A. MacNeill, Baptist pastor, held special meetings during Passion Week. There will be a union service tomorrow evening in the Presbyterian church to commemorate the great work of David Livingstone.
NEW ST. ANDREW'S SCHOOL.
The new Prince Arthur school at St. Andrew's was formally opened at a special assembly of the citizens yesterday afternoon. M. N. Cockburn, K. C., chairman of the school board, presided at the exercises. Among those who spoke were: W. S. Carter, M. A., LL.D., chief superintendent of education; Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, attorney-general; James Froom, M. A., and R. E. Armstrong, mayor of St. Andrew's. A handsome portrait of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught was unveiled by Miss Kathleen Cockburn, daughter of the chairman of the school board. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

ENGINEERS' BANQUET

A largely attended banquet was held in Wanamaker's restaurant last evening by the St. John Council, No. 2, of the Marine Engineers. There were about eighty present, the chairman being G. T. Blewett and the guest of the evening His Worship Mayor Prink, and D. G. Lingley, city chamberlain, representing the city, and W. P. Hatheway representing the labor interests. After a very fine dinner several speeches were made by the mayor, the chairman, the chamberlain and several others who referred to the city, and to the affairs of the engineers.
His worship in a short speech spoke of the growth of St. John, and the development now taking place here. He referred to the valuable aid which had been given by the federal government who had done their share in the development of the city, and spoke in a very optimistic way of the future.
G. T. Blewett, the chairman, spoke on the needs for technical schools in the city of St. John to train the young men. He referred to the agitation of some sixteen years ago for the establishment of these schools, and said that the same necessity was pressing nowadays. Mr. Blewett then made reference to the help which had been given the engineers of the city by the city council in the past, and the benefits which had accrued to the men through the advance in salaries. The method of granting of certificates came in for some criticism from the chairman, who said that while conditions were better than they used to be there was still room for improvement.
Speeches were also made by Messrs. McKee, Hatheway and Codner and the chamberlain.

AGED PRINCESS ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Rome, March 27—The Dowager Princess Marie Antonie Colonna di Pallano, mother of the Princess Teano, one of the most beautiful women in Europe, attempted to commit suicide in the Grand Hotel. The dowager princess is an old and eccentric Neapolitan noblewoman who generally resides in England. Four years ago she became suddenly demented in the central military station in Milan and has been under observation since.
The princess has been suffering from acute neurasthenia for some time, and in a fit of despondency slashed herself across the breast with a razor, causing a deep wound. Her maid discovered her lying on the floor, stanchioned the blood and called in a doctor.
The princess was unpopular because of her anti-patriotic attacks on Italians, and this resulted in her social ostracism and she is supposed to have brought on a fit of despondency which resulted in her attempt at suicide.

Daily Hints For the Cook

LETUCE AND TOMATO SALADS

For celery soup, take 3 stalks of celery, break in 1-inch pieces and cook in 1 pint boiling water until real soft. Rub through a sieve. Take 1/2 onion and 2 1/2 cups of milk. Sauté milk and then remove the onion. Add celery to the milk and thicken with 3 tablespoons of flour blended with enough water to make a paste. Add 2 tablespoons of butter and pepper and salt to taste.

Add 2 tablespoons of butter and pepper and salt to taste.
Put in a stew pan two pounds of veal, cut into pieces, just cover with cold water (for in a stew the juice is wanted in the liquor rather than in the meat), allow it to simmer until the meat is tender and the water reduced one-half; season with salt and pepper, add a tablespoon of flour, mixed smoothly with a little cold milk, and also a dessert spoon of butter, and serve.
