Noted Painter is Dead
Wiesbaden, Germany, June 25.—Sir Laurens Alma Tadema, a famous English painter, died here last night. He has been suffering from ulceration of the stomach, and was undergoing the cure. He was in his 77th year.

He was born at Dronrip in the Netherlands on January 8, 1836, but was naturalized in England. He received gold medals for his paintings from most of the prominent academies of Europe, and was decorated with most of the chivalric orders.
