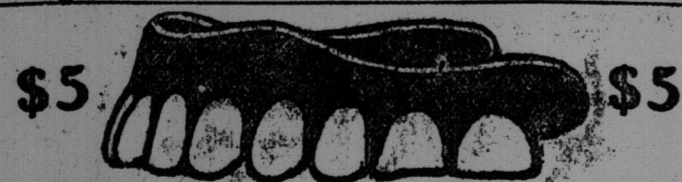

POLICE COURT

Teamster Charged With Driving Over New Laid Pavement Allowed Off With a Caution

The case against John Livingstone, a teamster, reported for driving over a portion of newly laid concrete in Smythe street, where the Hassan Paving Co. is at work, was dismissed this morning by the police court, but he was advised not to repeat the performance. Lewis Cameron, Robert Lewis, and Edward McHugh gave evidence that he had driven on concrete which was still soft, and his team had sunk in considerably. A fine of \$10 was imposed on a colored sailor, Joseph Williams, for assaulting another on board the steamer Osamo. Fines of \$5 or \$10 were imposed on John Donohoe and Edward McHugh on charges of drunkenness.

Matthew J. Butler, C. M. G., vice-president and general manager of the Dominion Iron & Steel Company, who is to address the Canadian Club this evening on the subject of "Transportation," arrived at noon. Mr. Butler was in Montreal attending a meeting of the directors of the company. The meeting he said was to deal with routine matters that required attention. CIRCUIT COURT NOW IN SESSION

Rossi and Fight Picture Cases the Features

ADDRESS TO JURY

Judge Landry suggests that business men who object to serving on grand jury ask legislature to abolish that body if they think justice would be served

The September sittings of the Circuit Court opened this morning at 11 o'clock in the court house. His Honor Mr. Justice Landry presiding. Attorney General Hasen appeared for the crown.

After his honor had charged the grand jury, that body retired at 11:30 and at 12:30 sent in word that they would adjourn until 2 o'clock. It is understood that the Rossi case was engaging their attention.

In opening his charge to the grand jury his honor thanked them for the large attendance. He said it was especially gratifying to see practically the full panel present, as last night he had been approached by a number of the panel who requested to be excused. "It pained me," said his honor, "to refuse business men who I know are telling the truth when they say their business needs their entire attention." His Honor pointed out that it was the duty of every good citizen to assist the court in carrying out the administration of justice. Continuing, he said that those who have obeyed the Sovereign's summons to come deserve the warmest thanks of the Crown. He advised the public if they thought that the administration of justice would not suffer by the abolition of the jury system they had better apply to the legislature to enact a law along that line. He then observed that those who were absent today would be fined.

Referring to the case against Rossi, charged with the murder of a companion, Siracusa, His Honor thought that there was sufficient evidence to indict the accused. He said they could, if they came to the conclusion that the evidence warranted, find a bill for manslaughter.

In regarding the case against Robert J. Armstrong, John C. Hooley and Charles Denzinger, charged with exhibiting the Jeffrey-Johnson moving pictures which "tend to corrupt public morals," his Honor said that there were cases of fact not of law, and therefore must be decided by the grand jury. His honor observed that this case was not brought for the purpose of punishing those charged but to deter others from committing the offence.

The grand jury retired at 11:30 and at 12:30 sent word to the court that they would adjourn until two o'clock this afternoon.
