MAJORITY STILL 50

Revised Lists Show Few Changes in the Standing.

TEMPLEMAN'S GOOD FIGHT

Victoria Minister Lost Seat by Narrow Majority of Five to G. H. Barnard—Loss of Caldwell's Seat in North Lanark Is Counterbalanced by McCool's Victory in Nipissing—Macdonald in N.S.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—The aftermath of the election reveals few changes. There are still several ridings in which the official returns when completed may alter the figures, but, according to the latest returns, the majority for the Liberal Government still stands at 50.

In North Lanark it was at first thought that Mr. T. B. Caldwell had succeeded in retaining the seat for the Liberals, but the anticipation was not borne out by the official returns, and last night the riding was conceded to his opponent, Mr. W. Thoburn, though only by a bare majority.

This change was counterbalanced, however, by the election for Nipissing of Mr. C. A. McCool, who in the earlier reports was stated to have been defeated by the Conservative candidate, Mr. G. Gordon.

So far, therefore, the position of the parties in Ontario remains as at first announced, namely: Conservatives, 47; Liberals 39, though there

He may become Speaker of Senate, is an unconfirmed rumor that Mr. W. R. Smythe has, after all, ousted Mr. A. E. Dymont from East Algoma. In Nova Scotia the Conservatives have to be content with six out of the eighteen seats. Mr. E. M. Macdonald, the brilliant young Liberal law-yeer of Pictou, winning out against his redoubtable opponent, Mr. C. E. Tanner, who was yesterday credited with the victory.

Two changes in the first list of returns are reported from British Columbia. After a stiff fight, Hon. W. Templeman has gone down in Victoria, Mr. G. H. Barnard, the Conservative candidate, with a majority of five, making the only breach in the ranks of the Cabinet, but there is consolation for Liberals in the fact that Mr. Ralph Smith has retained his seat by a substantial majority in Nanaimo.

Though the Manitoba returns are still somewhat doubtful in one or two instances, they point to a gain of another seat by the Conservatives, later despatches conceding the defeat of Mr. S. J. Jackson in Selkirk.

It is not at all improbable that the Speakership of the Senate will be given, when Parliament assembles, to Hon. R. W. Scott, the late Secretary of State.

The Senate elects an English and a French-speaking Senator, turn about.

PROTESTS IN SIGHT

Bristol's Election Methods in Toronto to Be Looked Into.

CONSERVATIVES ALSO BUSY

They Say They Can Prove Bribery in Renfrew But Will Not Protest Election—West Kent Tories Also Make Charges Against Mr. McCool's Followers and Say Money Changed Hands For Votes.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—There will be a protest in Centre Toronto if the statement given last evening is adhered to. T. C. Robinson, the defeated Liberal candidate, said last night: "The election in Centre Toronto will certainly be protested. Mr. Phalen will look after the legal proceedings. He has been making them all day. Already we have evidence of money being paid for votes."

Mr. Phalen said: "All that I care to say at present is that we have definite information that things were done in connection with Mr. Bristol's election which were irregular."

Vincenzo Cuchero, 8 Henry street, and Stanzo Zinera, 73 Elm street, were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday morning charged with personation in the Dominion election.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 28.—All trans-continental trains are now running through Western Canada. The snow has disappeared and there is a warm wave through Saskatchewan and Alberta and grain continues to be rushed to the lakes in enormous quantities. Freight trains are being operated within sight of each other for the greater part of 600 miles.

Farmer Suicides. Woodstock, Ont. 28.—James Barber, aged about 50, a well-known farmer of Blenheim, committed suicide by taking poison. He had just returned from a trip to the Northwest, and appeared to be suffering from melancholy, though the cause is unknown, as he was in good financial circumstances.

British Emigration to Canada. London, Oct. 28.—(C.A.P.)—The Board of Trade emigration returns for the year 1907, issued yesterday states that British and Irish emigrants to Canada in that year numbered 117,225. Of these 290 were rejected by the Canadian authorities for the following causes: As paupers or likely to become public charges, 153; for disease, 24; idiosyncrasy or insanity, 89; convicts, 4; returned with rejected emigrants, 9; immoral, 10; not stated, 1.

Twelve Killed on Canal. Washington, Oct. 28.—Information reached the Isthmian Canal offices in this city yesterday concerning two explosions of dynamite which occurred on the canal on Oct. 15, whereby 12 men were killed and 13 were injured, and the second at Mendez, where five men were killed, 10 injured and one missing. All of those killed and injured at Culebra Cut were negroes, excepting W. J. Davis, an engineer, and George Goodley, a crane man.

Took Coal Oil Shampoo. Kingston, Ont. 28.—Louise Meakin, an English immigrant, went suddenly insane here and had to be taken in charge by the authorities. She soaked her head with coal oil and was just in the act of applying a match when her rash was discovered by people in the house.

Recommend Glass Floors. London, Oct. 23.—Representatives of the Manchester Libraries committee, who recently visited a number of libraries in Canada, is a report just issued, recommended glass floors with ventilation openings
