

TELEGRAPH NEWS

London, Aug. 11. Narrow of a battle yet. The weather at the scene of military operations is very unpropitious. Wednesday night there was a great storm.

It is reported that the French army is suffering from lack of food and shelter. The Imperial headquarters have been removed from Metz.

Active naval operations on the Baltic are hourly expected. King William has issued a proclamation to the inhabitants of France, where his armies are, saying that he is waging war on soldiers not on private citizens, and promises protection to non-combatants.

Earl Derby yesterday delivered an address before the Association of Agriculturalists, at Blackpool, in which he alluded to the war, and strongly urged that England should maintain the policy of non-interference.

The Belgian King and Government, and the City Council of Brussels, have voted an address of thanks to Queen Victoria for assuring Belgium's neutrality.

An English banker named Elliott was yesterday arrested at Paris, while visiting his mother, charged with furnishing 10,000 pieces of French Army movements to the enemy.

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The Berlin Correspondent of the "Times" writes that England has declined to join with Austria in the League proposed by Von Bismarck guaranteeing the belligerents against loss of territory.

England's reason for declining is that the League could not save the North German Confederacy in case Prussia should be defeated.

The "Echo" asserts, without qualification, that the Emperor Eugene and the Prince Imperial are in Lodz, in St. John's Wood.

The "Weekly Register" has the same report, which, however, gives with confidence, as not to place too much confidence in its correctness.

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The Prussians are massed around the city. A special despatch from Haguenau, dated today, says that Marshal McMahon's army evacuated Nancy yesterday on the pretence of the German Government, and returned across the Moselle to the frontier of Prussia.

The French destroyed a fine bridge of seven arches, which spanned the river. The Prussians attacked Pont-a-Mousson, driving out the French, but subsequently fell back to the main body.

Paris—Two buildings in the upper part of Woodstock, owned respectively by John C. Wilson and John McGrath were destroyed by fire last week. On the night of the 8th the dwelling house, store public hall, and barns belonging to Mr. S. N. Raymond, at Aberdeen, Clinton County, were burnt down.

The new race boat arrived safe and in good condition in the steamer on Saturday, and was taken up to the training ground at Brandywine's Point this morning.

From the telegrams in Boston papers we gather intelligence with reference to the all-embracing topics of the war in Europe.

The Post contradicts the evening paper's assertion that the Prince Imperial is with the Emperor.
