The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75.-(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the

proper national colors-(a) on a signal made to her by one of Mis Majesty's ships including any vessel under the command of an officer of A Majesty's navy or full pay, and

(b) on entering or leaving any foreign pert and (c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be Mable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon. Registrer of Shipping
