WICKED WORDS FROM A PARSON. One Who Sipped Glass of McKimley's. Death Denounced by Parliament.

VIRGILAND, N. S., (Sept. 22)—There was great indignation throughout town today over a sermon preached by the Rev. John G. Entekin, at the Wesleyan Methodist church, disparaging the late president.

In referring to Mr. McKimley's death the speaker said that his assassination was a judgment and a punishment on the government for the "horrible murdering" of the Philippines and the furnishing of munitions of war to England with which to murder the Boers.
