He stated that every few days the fail becomes overcrowded and that Jailor Clifford has to furnish him with lists of names of those whose time is nearly up or who can be most justly released in order to make room for the new arrivals. This has been going on for quite a long time and will continue until steps are taken to reake the fail a place not of comfort, but to be shunned. The new wing is not in use yet but even it will not furnish accommodation for all who are sentenced provided they are kept in

Chief of Police Clark, speaking on the same subject, referred to his yearly re-rorts in which he strongly advocated forts in which he strongly advocated sending the prisoners to work on the streets or in the park.
