### Sporting News.

night, when important matters con-  
nected with the schedule will be dis-  
cussed.

#### C. P. R. AGREEMENT.

His worship Mayor White yesterday  
had a conference with Superintendent  
Downie of the C. P. R. at the city hall,  
the chief magistrate having asked the  
C. P. R. representative down here to  
call on him that he might call atten-  
tion to the fact that the agreement by  
which St. John places itself on record  
as willing to enter into a contract with  
the C. P. R. for the provision of addi-  
tional wharves and warehouses at  
Sand Point provided the assistance ex-  
pected from the Dominion government  
is forthcoming had passed the council  
some days ago. A copy of the docu-  
ment had been forwarded to Sir Thos.  
Shaughnessy.  
It was very important, the mayor  
pointed out, that the city should know  
without any unnecessary delay if the  
terms of the agreement would meet  
with the approval of the C. P. R. The  
mayor impressed upon the representa-  
tive that the city would like to have the  
C. P. R. communicate with the city to  
let them know at the earliest date  
what conclusion the C. P. R. man-  
agement had arrived at. Already con-  
siderable delay had occurred in this  
matter, and there was no reason why  
it should continue much longer.  
Mr. Downie promised at once to  
enter into correspondence with the C.  
P. R. principals with this object in  
view.

CHARGED WITH FRAUD.  
Isaac Burpee Arrested in St. Louis for  
Fraud in the Yukon.

OTTAWA, May 11.—Isaac Burpee  
was arrested in St. Louis today at the  
instance of the department of justice  
on a charge of being a defaulter from  
the Yukon.  
The case is not one in which the gov-  
ernment is interested beyond preserv-  
ing the good name of the Yukon Ter-  
ritory as a place for maintaining law  
and order.  
Burpee was in business with some  
parties near Dawson. His partners say  
that he defrauded them and left for the  
outside. He was traced to the United  
States and Colonel Sherwood, chief of  
the Dominion police, is now in St.  
Louis arranging for his extradition, so  
that he can be taken back to Dawson  
to stand trial.
