## SUNDAY TRAGEDIES

NOUNVILLE, W. Va., July 6.—Two men were killed and two others probably fatally injured today when a sand car failed to make a switch and overturned, crushing the four occupants.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 6.—A special from Ketchikan Canon on the Skeena River tonight says that the stern-wheel steamer, Mount Royal struck a rock this afternoon and went to the bottom within five minutes. It is reported that a number of lives were lost and that a small island in the canyon is covered with survivors.

BOSTON, Mass., July 7.—Marcellus B. Walton of 21 Mead street, Somerville, was accidentally drowned while canoeing with a companion in Sny Pond today. The two had been bathing and were fooling in the boat when it tipped over, Walton being pitched into the mud in shallow water. When he came up his mouth and face were so filled with mud he could not breathe and he sank and was drowned. He was 29 years of age.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 7.—Edward W. Everson, a contractor, living in Edgewood, was seriously injured in an automobile accident here late today, and five other persons, three of them small children, who were riding with him, were badly shaken up, and also bruised. Mr. Everson sustained fractures of the skull and nose and contusions. Edward Bishop of New York, his nephew, who was at the wheel of the machine, was badly bruised. Mary Runnels, aged 5, and Lucia Leith, aged 4, who were in the rear seat, suffered the loss of some teeth from being suddenly thrown against the seat in front.

The other occupants of the vehicle, Frank Willis, of Edgewood, and his infant daughter, escaped with a severe shaking though both were thrown out.

The automobile was going along Broad street behind an electric car and in attempting to turn in Stanwood street, was struck, heavily by a car moving in the opposite direction. Mr. Everson was taken to the Rhode Island hospital where his condition is regarded as critical.

BOSTON, Mass., July 7.—Albert D. Royal, aged 46 and single, living with his mother at 113 Falmouth street, committed suicide today. His body

was found on the floor with his throat cut while a razor and a knife lay nearby. Royal had recently returned from a hospital for the insane.

GLASTONBURY, Conn., July 7.—In an attempt to rescue his niece, Miss Jennie Baxter, of Hartford, from drowning in the Connecticut River this afternoon Carl Eunck went down to death with her off Crow's Point, Wright's Island. Both had come down the river in a power boat with ten others this morning and the boat had been tied up at that point to allow some of the party to go ashore. Miss Baxter was eighteen years old and her uncle, who also lived in Hartford, fifty and married.

Miss Baxter, who was accounted a fair swimmer, had gone into the water. When some distance from shore she began to sink and called for help. Eunck, without waiting to remove any of his clothes leaped into the water and swam to her assistance. He was nearing the bank with her when she gripped him in such a way that he could not help himself nor keep above water.

Both bodies were recovered, about a half hour later.

MONTEPELIER, Vt., July 7.—John Maloney, of North Fayston was brought here today in custody of Sheriff F. H. Tracy and held pending an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the death of Levi Sun whose body was found near Middlesex early Saturday morning. Sun was a teamster and his body with a bruise over one eye was found lying in the road near his home which had stood by him probably all night. He and Maloney were said to have been drinking and the officers are in doubt as to whether Sun met his death through a fall from his wagon, white intoxicated or as a result of a quarrel with Maloney. Maloney said he has no recollection of what happened which he was with Sun Friday night. Sun's vital organs will be examined by Dr. B. H. Stone of the state laboratory, who came to this city from Burlington.

BOSTON, Mass., July 7.—The tug Annie Emmons, one of the smallest tug boats doing towing business about Boston harbor, caught fire in Shirley Cut, while going outside, early today, and after being beached in the breakers off Short Beach burned to the water's edge. Five men who were aboard succeeded in launching a dory from the tug and were picked up in her by a motor boat and towed into the harbor.

### BARDS PROCLAIM

THEIR ANNUAL FEAST

Thousands of Welshmen Assemble to Hear Date of Next Eldestfod Announced.

CARDIFF, July 6. — Thousands of enthusiastic Welshmen assembled in Llangollen yesterday to witness the picturesque ceremony of the proclamation of the Welsh National Eldestfod, which will be held in the town next year. The ceremony took place in the beautiful grounds adjacent to Plas Newydd, once the residence of the famous ladies of Llangollen. Here the Gorsedd Circle, consisting of twelve massive boulders, each weighing over two tons, had been laid out.

Accompanied by fifty bands, and in picturesque costume, the Archdruid Dyfed, repaired to the circle during the morning. Mounting the centre boulder, he demanded, "Is it peace?" and there was a cry in the affirmative from the bards. Then the massive Gorsedd sword was sheathed, and the archdruid proclaimed the Eldestfod "to be held in September, 1908, 'in the face of the sun and the light of the eye'."

The subsequent proceedings in the afternoon were of a more imposing character. In the presence of thousands of spectators, there was a procession through the gaily decorated streets. First came two Llangollen ladies, in national costumes, accompanied by a Welsh goat. Then, behind the Red Dragon banner of Wales, came local yeomanry, volunteers, constabulary and public authorities. Next came the Gorsedd sword-studded banner, the Gorsedd sword, and on a bier was borne the massive Iffrits horn. Then followed the archdruid, members of Poddiamant, sheriffs, local mayors, magistrates and other functionaries. Arrived at the circle, a loud blast on the Corn Gwlad was the signal for the assembly. A symbolical wreath was presented to the archdruid, who then slipped from the Iffrits horn, containing mead, which was presented to him by a woman. Subsequent proceedings consisted of harp and vocal music, addresses and the initiation of new bards.

### SHOT BY STRANGER

SHE REFUSED TO MARRY

Unknown Fires Five Bullets at Her and Kills Himself With the Sixth.

GENEVA, July 6.—Mlle. Preda, the daughter of a wealthy Swiss painter, was yesterday shot by a man named Joseph Vignato, 23 years of age, who was unknown to her.

She was walking in a wood above the little town of Davos, when Vignato met her, and, pointing a revolver at her, demanded that she should promise to marry him.

She politely declined, whereupon the man fired at her five times, and then, with the sixth shot, blew off his own brains.

Mlle. Preda, who was found some time after, lying helpless, died in the body of the man, had been struck by three bullets, none of which, however, had injured a vital part.

She is expected to recover.

### FIREMEN FIREBUGS

SENT TO PRISON

Were in Habit of Burning Houses to Get Insurance and Beautify Town.

BERLIN, July 6.—A trial which has engaged the criminal court at Freiburg in Saxony for a month, and attracted much attention, concluded today.

Several of the officials, including the mayor and the captain of the fire brigade, prominent citizens, were arraigned for systematically setting fire to over sixty houses in Siebenbrunn, where they lived, with the object of obtaining insurance money and of building better houses.

Almost every citizen of Siebenbrunn was in this incendiary business, which had been proceeding for ten years. When a gadman once wished to interfere and learn the cause of a conflagration, the fire brigade simply turned the hose on him, and he left the scene of operations.

In their defense, they said their object was to beautify their town. The best of it all is that several of the principal culprits, on the mayor's recommendation, were decorated by the king of Saxony for their diligence and courage in extinguishing fires. The ringleaders were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment, from three and a half years to seven months.
