THE WEATHER

LOCAL NEWS

W. M. Collins came in on the Boston train this morning.

The Anglo-American Telegraph Co's cable to F. E. Island, which was broken a week ago, has been repaired. Communication was restored on Sunday afternoon.

There will be a united meeting in Carlton tonight of all the local corps of the Salvation Army. Tomorrow night there will be a half night of prayer in the Salvation Hall, at Carlton.

A mass meeting of Christian Endeavorers is to be held in Ludlow St. United Baptist Church, West End, this evening. Addresses will be given by Rev. David Hutchinson, Rev. J. W. Kienstedt and others. Master Eldon Morrish will sing.

In the game of baseball at Rothesay on Saturday afternoon the High School boys were defeated by the Rothesay 17 to 11. Willis and Lynch for High School and Shaw and Alward for Rothesay.

The steamer May Queen will make her trial trip this afternoon. She has received her spring repairs and was inspected this morning. Although the date has not yet been definitely fixed she will probably be put on the Grand Lake route again at an early date.

The freight at Indiantown shows little change, at present the high spring tides assisting in keeping up the level. The river steamers brought down fair quantities of stuff on Saturday, but for the next month trade will probably be rather slack, while the drifters are busy with their spring planting.

Thos. H. Ryan died yesterday at the Hawthorne House, Loch Lomond, in the 71st year of his age. He leaves two daughters and one son. The funeral will be held from his late residence and the burial will be at Ryan's settlement.

The second annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick municipalities will be held in Fredericton tomorrow and Wednesday. Ex-Mayor Sears, Ald. Christie and Ald. Hamm were appointed delegates to this convention, but at present there is some doubt as to how many of the representation will go.

The case of Barrett vs. the King was resumed in the Exchequer Court this morning before Judge Casella. The evidence of the defendant, who told of the injury done to his property at Crouville by reason of the government work, was heard during the morning session. E. H. McAlpine cross-examined the witness.

The harbor fishermen report the catch of gaspereaux poorer this spring than ever before experienced. They say the weather is not too cold but there seems to be a great scarcity of fish for this time of the year. Those being captured by the drifters are being brought from 10 to 20 cents per hundred.

The four local prisoners, O'Brien, Cook, Morris and a West Indian colored boy, charged with escaping from the chain gang, were called a few days ago before Judge Forbes, who if they had desired to take advantage of the speedy trial act, would have quickly attended to them. The quartette, however, chose to be tried by a jury and will go before the county court a week from tomorrow. In the absence of Judge Forbes from the city Judge Wells will preside.

UNLICENSED DOGS TO THE NUMBER OF 1265

The western division of the police force have this morning reported that there are 101 persons on the western side of the harbor who own unlicensed dogs. This number with 555 persons in the North End and 602 in the southern division make a total of 1265 citizens who will have to take out licenses or be liable to a four dollar fine in the police court on Dog Day, June 1st.

PROBATE COURT

Estate of Dr. Chas. Hollen—Adjourned hearing on passing accounts. The hearing is further adjourned till Thursday, 11th June. Barnhill, Ewing and Sanford, proctors for the admistratrix; John Willett, K. C., and S. A. M. Skinner, for creditors.

The above two adjournments were rendered necessary pending legislation making valid the adjournments made by the ex-registrar after the death of the late Judge of Probate.

Estate of Jas. Donovan, farmer. Petition of his eight children in favor of administration being granted to Theresa L. Donovan, who is sworn in as properly \$250. Hazen & Raymond, executrix. No real estate; personal proctors.

GRANITE MEN SAY THAT MARBLE IS NO GOOD

They Object to the Statement That Grey Granite Becomes Dull In Color.

A number of granite manufacturers in and about the city take exception to certain statements printed in the Star on Saturday, will regard so the relative qualities of marble and grey granite. They are of the decided opinion that for monumental and in fact for all work granite is immeasurably superior to marble. The contention that inscriptions on granite become obliterated after a very few years, they state is not correct, but in certain cases these inscriptions do become dim, not through the fault of the stone, but because of the manner in which the work is done. A good many people when having monuments made insist that the lettering shall be printed. When this is done the oil from the paint soaks into the stone giving it a dull look, and in order that this may be overcome it is necessary to repaint the lettering. When the cut stone is left alone or even when a properly gilded inscription remains clear indefinitely. Granite men state that marble has long ago been abandoned as a material for monuments because not only inscriptions carved in it but the whole stone is very quickly affected by weathered conditions. In proof of this they point to Farnhill where the most expensive monuments made years ago are of marble and have not kept their appearance nearly as well as those made of granite.

THE SHEFFIELD ST. CROWD WILL BE DEALT WITH TODAY

Amelia Francis and Friends Were Remanded Until This Afternoon.

This morning's session of the police court was a rather brief one, for in the absence of Magistrate Ritchie, acting Magistrate Henderson finally ordered four dollars, and remanded six other prisoners until this afternoon, when the magistrate will deal with them.

The prisoners remanded were Amelia Francis, charged with being the keeper of a bawdy house on Sheffield street; and Lillian Norman, Lucy Bayard and Harry McNally, who are charged with being inmates. Amelia Francis might have had a bawdy house, but she didn't keep inmates. The inmates said they were there at the time of the raid, but did not plead. On Saturday morning a man claimed to have been robbed in the Francis woman's house, and as a result, Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Kilian took the raid on Saturday night. In the excitement which prevailed Lizzie Norman escaped through a rear window, but was captured later in the night by Policemen Lucas and Sullivan.

For some time the police have been awaiting a chance to raid a couple of Sheffield street resorts, and in fact the magistrate has signified his desire to clean them out. Only a few days ago Michael Barry was thrown out of the Francis house with a broken ankle, which he sustained during a row. Mand Lester, a young woman who spends a great deal of her time in jail, was arrested by Policeman Sullivan on Carmichael street for stealing a satisfactory account of herself, also with being a vagrant. She was remanded to jail until this afternoon.

SAVED HIS COMPANION BUT LOST HIS SHIRT

Close Shave for a King Square Barber—Flashed Out by His Friend.

A King Square barber and a South End teamster had the experience of their lives early Sunday morning. In company with others they left the city last Saturday night with a goodly quantity of fishing gear, and bait. On arrival at the fishing grounds near Loch Lomond, the two decided to steal a march on their companions, and at the dawn of Sunday morning they rowed out into the lake and began to cast. The barber being fatigued from scraping many faces during Saturday night, cast his fly so far over the water, that he lost his balance and tumbled into the lake. The teamster was no coward, for without waiting to take off his heavy clothing he plunged in after his friend and after a desperate struggle reached the shore, both pretty well exhausted.

A nearby farmer was awakened, a fire was made in the kitchen stove and the farmer supplied dry clothing. The affair was then looked on as a joke, but when the teamster went to get his shirt from the oven door where it had been drying he was deeply grieved to find that the best part of it had been burned. The couple were greeted by a large number of friends last night, on their arrival home. The teamster was given three cheers for his heroic action and was presented with a new shirt.
