Premier Hazen returned today from Montreal and Ottawa, where he has been on provincial business. Speaking to the Star he said that he could give nothing regarding the results of his trip at present.

The Beulah camp meetings will be held from July 4th to the nineteenth of this year. Rev. C. H. Harrison will be the chief speaker.

Repairs are being hurried on the S. S. Hampstead, which unshipped her rudder at Gagetown on Wednesday and it is expected that she will leave this evening for St. John.

J. W. Vanwart, J. A. Lippert, George Stocum and Donaldson Hunt went fishing to Pooloogan on Wednesday, and returned this morning with two hundred trout.

The charge preferred against Dr. Carruete by W. V. Hatfield, for dumping coal on the Union street sidewalk was to have been heard this morning, but was adjourned until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

Members of officers' families wishing to attend the service on Sunday afternoon must obtain tickets from the office of the D. O. C. Canada Permanent Building, and entrance will be by Charlotte street only as the Germania street gates will be closed until the arrival of the military.

Geo. Cook, of Fredericton, is in the city making arrangements to erect a merry-go-round on a vacant lot facing the mill pond at West St. John. The exact site will be settled by Engineer Peters this afternoon. The city will get a license fee of ten dollars per week from the owner of the lot.

A mixture of Boundary Line Run and the St. John fall bird bred on Tuesday evening made one of the worst cases of rowdiness the village has seen for some time. About three weeks ago three or four St. John boys landed here dead broke from the G. T. R., and obtained work from H. P. Giberson. They proved good workers and seemed quiet and industrious young fellows under hard luck. But on Tuesday night, their first job about finished and a few dollars in their pockets, they showed up in unenviable style, one of their number especially showing the car brand to perfection.—Victoria Co. News.

Friends of Miss Alice Helen Wetmore will be interested to learn that she returned home from Berlin about two weeks since, where she has been studying for the past year under Madam Nickish. Miss Wetmore will spend the summer months with her parents, and expects to return to Leipzig in the autumn, where she will spend the winter with her teacher, Madam Nickish. Miss Wetmore made decided good progress under Madam Nickish, who predicts a brilliant future for her. Professor Nickish, husband of Madam Nickish, was about 15 years since, the leader of the Symphony Orchestra in Boston, and now has the distinction of being without a peer in music in Berlin.—Transcript.

RIVER STEAMERS RACING

The rivalry between the Aberdeen and the Sincennes is resulting in some interesting races these days. Yesterday morning the Sincennes pulled out first with the Aberdeen close behind her. The latter caught her rival at the narrows and from there to the Boars' Head there was a neck and neck race. After passing the Head the Aberdeen pulled ahead and gradually increased her lead, carrying off the honors for the day.

THE MISCOUCHE MURDER

At the second day's trial of Alonzo Doherty charged with the murder of Joseph D. McMillan, of Miscouche, P. E. I., on May 10th, Stella McDonald, who was the only witness of the tragedy, gave evidence. She told of her engagement of marriage with Doherty and of McMillan, who was a neighbor, paying her friendly visits. She told of her walk with McMillan and of Doherty shooting him, of the removal of the body and then the telling of the priest of what had happened. She said she had seen Doherty with a revolver on two other occasions.

The defense put up a plea of insanity, and the prisoner's father told of his being injured when quite young.

The prisoner gave evidence that he never had a quarrel with McMillan. He did not remember firing a revolver and the murder was a blank to him. The case is being resumed today.

THE SEARCH CONTINUED

Search for the body of George Connolly was continued without success yesterday. It is the intention of the searchers to try a new place this afternoon. At dead water they will drag what is known as the flats, the cove above Cushing's mill, as it is thought the eddy might have carried the body in that direction.

MINISTER GOT PAID FOR HOLDING BURIAL SERVICE

A New Source of Revenue Discovered—Marriages Not Very Profitable This Year.

"I made five dollars at a funeral the other day," said a well known city clergyman to the Star yesterday. "It was the surprise of my life. We never expect any fees for such services, and I never before knew of anyone in this province receiving money. In weddings it is a different matter. People always expect to pay the minister who marries them, and as a rule the clergyman expect some remuneration for their work. It is of course pleasant to be qualified officials at such interesting events, but when they come in one's regular line of duty they cease to be wholly pleasurable and become what in any other business would be regarded as extra work. With funerals it is different. People cannot help dying and surely the relatives would be bear enough in sorrow and expense without having to pay for the burial service. Yet when you come to think of it there are lots of people who never attach themselves to any church and when death comes have no claim to the services of any particular clergyman. They have in their lifetime failed to make towards the support of the church, and it is not after all unreasonable to accept pay from them for the last service. I know that this is done across the border, but the custom has never reached New Brunswick to my knowledge. In the case I speak of the body was brought here from the United States by relatives. After the service one of the friends offered me an envelope which I promptly declined to accept. He insisted; I refused. Later in the day as he was leaving he quietly forced it on me and was gone before I had opportunity to return it. I put it in my pocket, and on reaching home found it contained five dollars.

"Did it go to my wife, as wedding money does? Well, that belief about wedding money is only true in the sense that it follows the same route as all other cash received by ministers. I would like to know the clergyman in this province who does not have to give his wife, for ordinary expenses, every cent he earns, and who does not need more than he gets.

"Weddings are a failure this year. They do not seem to be as numerous as usual, nor are the bridegrooms paying up as well."

ROGERS SENT UP FOR TRIAL ON THE CHARGE OF THEFT

Would-be Suicide Was This Morning Remanded—Two Drunks Fined—Sheffield St. Cases up Again.

In the police court this morning two drunks who fined \$5 or two months each. One of them was Wm. Harritz, whose mother had to have him ejected from her house last night. The other was an old offender, Mary Ann Reid.

Wm. Myles, was charged with attempt at suicide here from the St. John's. Wm. Rogers, charged with obtaining goods on Wednesday last under false pretences, was before the court.

Jas. A. Kirk, a clerk in D. J. Purdy's store North End, gave evidence that he received a telephone message Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock from a man who said he was Pilot Rogers. He said he wanted some things for the pilot boat H. D. Troop and would send a boy after them.

The defendant called at the store and he was after the goods for the pilot boat, and would carry them as the boat was waiting for them. He took ten pounds of tea, about 15 pounds of butter, two bottles extract of vanilla and a twenty-one pound ham, with a total value of \$24. The telephone message was supposed by witness to come from John Spiane's store. Witness identified the ham, butter and vanilla as the property of D. J. Purdy.

A clerk in Short's meat market, Main street, told the court of Rogers selling her part tub of butter for \$2.40.

John Spiane testified that he had done business for the pilot boat H. D. Troop, and the defendant was not employed on the vessel, and that on the morning in question neither he nor any other person telephoned from his store to Purdy's for groceries. The pilot boat was aground on Wednesday morning, being painted.

Hugh McCormick, a Main street barber, gave evidence of Rogers trying to sell him a ham on Wednesday morning, and defendant then was under the influence of liquor.

Policeman Merrick told the court of making enquiries about Rogers' actions and arresting him. The magistrate committed Rogers to trial at the next sitting of the circuit court, which opens next Tuesday, and in so doing adjudged guilty, and allowed to go on suspended sentence. I could now send you to jail for a year. You put up the plea of being drunk as a defence. I say that drunkenness is no excuse according to law, and will send you up for trial. If you keep on with that defence in the other court you can't tell how successful you will be.

The fighting case of Marshall and Lee was again before the court. Marshall was allowed to go to his work and told he did not appear as a witness. The case was again remanded to jail.

Mattie Lee and George Lee, charged with stealing a horse from Percy Earnest, were again before the court and were represented by E. S. Ritchie. Policeman Lucas was the only witness and said: "You were before me in my shop, and the Lee's saying they knew nothing of the money. After a search they blamed each other for putting the money in a coal pile. Sergeant Campbell dug the money out of the coal. The prisoners were remanded until this afternoon, when Officers Campbell and Sullivan will testify.

Annie Taylor, charged with keeping a bawdy house, and Agnes Cunningham with being an inmate, were before the court and remanded until this afternoon.
