The most reasonable solution of the problem and the one that he thought must be adopted, was the taking of young men from other pro-fessions, giving them a short course in English, rhetoric and the English Bible, with attention to economics and the science of praching and put-ting there in the ministry. "In all the eastern cities," said Dr. Gordon, "there are many young men well educated and qualified with a lit-te training to go into the west land and do great work for the country for with the constant influx of new people it is a problem to hold the country true." Dr. Gordon here remarked upon the great immigration from the United States into the west, and said that while the Americans made excellent settlers they did not average up to the standard of Canadians in moral life. The Sabbath meant less to them, and although there were very many fme Christian men among them, there was still a need there. Real Estate in Winnipeg.
