LIVES WAGERED ON BILLIARD GAME

Play to Decide Which Shall Kill Father and Which Brother for Inheritance - Police Fortunately Intervene in Time to Save Lives - Heartbroken Father Becomes Insane.

Paris, Nov. 23.—Two brothers, Joseph and Camille Rostaing are in prison in Grenoble for the attempted murder of their father and their brother, and for assaulting the police.

Both Camille and Joseph have been in prison more than once, and hated with the hatred of bad men both brother Charles, who is a decent fellow, and works hard to keep a house roof over his father's head and his own.

One day the two convicts found the place where Gustave Rostaing kept his savings, a wooden stocking stuffed into an empty jar, robbed it and spent the money in a week in Grenoble. This was too much. Old Rostaing went to the police.

An evening Camille conceived a terrible idea. He and his brother had been drinking and were now playing billiards in a cafe.

"I'll tell you what we'll do," said Camille. "The old man has lots more money somewhere and that stunk Charles has put by some money, too."

"And I'll tell you how we'll do it. I'll play you a game of billiards. The winner shall have for Charles, and the loser shall tackle the old man."

They had been alone in the cafe at its beginning. But both were good players. Several people looked in to watch them playing, and before long there were a dozen people in the room.

The two brothers had started their game on an abject note. As the points crept up, both drank a good deal, and as they drank the stakes were raised.

A man slipped out of the cafe and ran to warn the gardemes. There are only three of them at Montlieu, Verclieu, but these took no notice of them nor of the frightened crowd which had collected around their father's house.

SEEKS HUSBAND; DYING BOY WANTS HIM: Baltimore Woman Asks Police to Search for Man Missing Six Weeks—Plea of Six Child.

Boston, Nov. 22.—That she most gratefully the wish of her dying boy to see his father "before God takes me," Mrs. Phillip L. Rest of 3709 F Avenue, Baltimore, writes to Superintendent of Police Taylor yesterday asking him to search in this city for her husband, who has been missing six weeks.

According to Mrs. Rest's letter, little son is not expected to live more than a week, and she said she has often brought tears to her eyes appealing to see his father. "I want see papa before God takes me," is what the boy usually appeals to mother.

In an effort to find a sister she is not seen for thirty-two years and who she is supposed to live in this city, Mrs. Rose Slemom of 343 Madison street, New Haven, Conn., has written to Superintendent Taylor requesting him to search for the missing woman here. She is a sister of her late husband, Charles A. Scullion, Mount Angel, Oregon, who also writes to Superintendent Taylor, saying that his uncle is John Scullion, who two years ago worked in the foundry Hoopes and Townsend, at Broad & Buttonwood streets.

A request was made of Superintendent Taylor yesterday by Wm. J. Mil of 1013 Berri street, Montreal, Canada, to search this city for his brother, Edward Milten, whom he is anxious to locate.
