

REICKER GETS FIVE YEARS IN DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY

Escaped from Boys' Industrial Home and Broke into Summer Camps—Jury Disagrees in Case of Crowley and Ellsworth, Charged with Theft.

At yesterday afternoon's session of the County Court the jury disagreed in the case of the King vs. Fred Ellsworth and Patrick Crowley, charged with stealing an overcoat and gloves valued at \$15 from Wm. E. Dennings, also an overcoat valued at \$35 from Sheriff deForest.

After being out about an hour the jury returned and announced a verdict of guilty against Crowley and a disagreement in the case of Ellsworth. They were instructed by His Honor that the prisoners were charged with acting together in the commission of the offence, and both would have to be acquitted or found guilty. The jury later announced through their foreman a disagreement in both cases. The case will be tried again on Monday.

The Crown witnesses were Stephen deForest, Wm. E. Dennings, Wm. Briggs, janitor at the Salvation Army Metropolis, Thomas Ryan, who purchased the overcoat for \$3; Wm. Cummings, manager of the Metropolis and Detective Killen.

The prisoners were not represented by counsel, and Ellsworth addressed the jury in his own behalf, stating that he thought he could not be found guilty as he only sold the coat and had nothing to do with the actual stealing.

The case of the King vs. McDonald charged with theft and obtaining money by false pretenses will be presented to the Grand Jury on next Monday morning. One of the Crown witnesses was too ill to attend court, Ralph St. J. Press appeared for the prisoner, E. T. C. Knowles, K. C., appeared in behalf of the attorney general.

FORMAL OPENING OF CAMPBELLTON CHURCH

Christ Church Opened on Sunday—Bishop Richardson Conducted Services Before Large Congregations.

Campbellton, Feb. 23.—The formal opening of Christ Church took place today. The opening services were conducted by the Right Reverend Dr. Richardson, Lord Bishop of Fredericton, and were closely followed by a large and interested congregation. There were services morning, afternoon and evening. His Lordship was the speaker at the services. The "workmanship" reflects much credit upon the builders, D. A. Stewart. The work was done from the plans of P. N. Brodie of St. John, N. B. The structure is of brick and the trimmings are concrete. It is much larger than the old building which was destroyed by the Campbellton fire of July 1, 1910. The heating system is of an efficient and up to date type. The pews, choir stalls, communion table, chancel chairs, lectern, hymn boards and altar were donated by members and friends of the congregation.

BUSY DAY IN POLICE COURT

Chinese Assault Case Occupied Much Time Yesterday—Other Assault and Theft Cases also Taken up.

Magistrate Ritchie had a busy time of it yesterday, cases being dealt with during the morning and afternoon. At the morning session three drunken men were fined the usual amount.

John Griffin, found guilty of throwing snowballs and using abusive language on Erie street, to Ernest Laird, was fined \$20 or two months in jail. J. D. P. Lewis appeared on behalf of Will Sing, a Chinese laundryman, who charged Hum Ying, Hum One and Hum Yuen with assaulting him. Geo. H. V. Belyea appeared for the defence.

The plaintiff or the defendants could not talk English and the services of an interpreter were necessary. The latter happened to be the same man who acted in a similar capacity for the plaintiffs in a recent long drawn out case.

The complainant, Will Sing, gave evidence that he conducted a laundry in the West Side. On Monday morning he was struck on the head and kept by the defendants to collect payment for the business which he had sold to them. He asked Hum Yuen for the money which Hum refused to give. Hum One then closed the door and the three defendants beat Sing, hitting him on the face and the hand with a spoon. They then struck him from behind and knocked him down on the floor and finally threw him from the shop. In cross examination by Mr. Belyea, Sing stated he had been in partnership with Hum Yuen and when he returned to China he bought him out for \$460. Hum One, he stated, never owned the laundry.

Hum One was called and said that he and Hum Yuen and Hum Yung owned the laundry on Ludlow street. On Monday he asked Will Sing in the shop for money he owed him but the latter denied the debt. Witness said that he had paid Will Sing's head tax when he came to this country. Witness and the other two defendants were fined having struck the plaintiff. The case was taken up again in the afternoon and after hearing a couple of Chinese was again adjourned until this morning.

NEWS IN SHORT METRE

The Beaver Loss. It is understood that the loss to the dredge Beaver by fire has been placed at \$24,000.

Will Build Houses. The New Brunswick Realty Company is preparing to erect four self-contained dwellings on Douglas street, on the property recently acquired from P. Neil Brodie.

Injured at Sand Point. Michael Joseph Jones, a workman, was seriously injured at Sand Point yesterday morning when he was jammed against a freight car. He was taken to the hospital.

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Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill respecting the oyster fisheries of the province. He said that the bill contained two parts, the first of which provided for a survey of certain barren beds which it is proposed to lease and the second part dealt with the arrangements which were being entered into with the Canadian Oyster Co. for the cultivation on a large scale of oysters on certain barren beds in this province.

After referring to the big returns which had come from the oyster business in the State of Rhode Island and elsewhere, he said that he believed the oyster business had the advantage of the water being cooler and other natural advantages which other places to the south of New Brunswick did not have.

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Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved that a bill to consolidate an act respecting the rates and taxes be referred back to the committee for the session.

The house went into committee with Mr. Young in the chair and amendment.

Hon. Mr. Fleming for the committee to nominate standing committee on the bill to amend the act to amend the Lancaster Sewerage Act of 1903 were agreed to with amendments.

Hon. Mr. Landry introduced a bill to prevent the spread of insects, pests, and plant diseases destructive to vegetation. He explained that this bill was for the purpose of putting New Brunswick with the other provinces of the Dominion. British Columbia, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and other provinces had acts along the lines of this bill and there was also federal legislation of a similar nature. This province has to import large quantities of vegetation called nursery stock and this legislation was for the better protection of such stock.
