30,000 PRISONERS GERMANS CLAIM MORE THA

CAPTURE OF PERONNE AND HAM CLAIMED BY BERLIN WAR OFFICE

Victory in Battle Which Has Been Raging Near Monchy, Cambrai, St. Quentin and La Fere Asserted by the Germans-Heaviest Losses on the Line from Bapaume to Bouchavesnes and Behind Somme Between Peronne and Ham, as Well as at Chauny.

Berlin, March 24—(Via London, British Admiralty per wireless press)

—The Germans have captured Peronne and Ham and defeated British and American regiments brought up from
the southwest for a counter-stack on Chauny, according to the war office
statement.

The statement adds that more than
30,000 prisoners have been captured
and 600 guns have been taken by the
Germans.

Victory in the battle which has been
raging near Monchy, Cambral, St.
Quentin and La Fere is claimed by
the Germans. The British hird and
fourth armies and parts of Francoomerican reserves are declared to have
hen beaten, with the heavest losses
in the line from Bapaume to Bouchavesnes and behind the Somme between Peronne and Ham, as well as
at Chauny.

SOME CAPTURED GERMAN GUNS WERE BROUGHT FROM BALKANS

Huns Lost Heavily in Attempting to Cross Somme by Means of Four Bridges-All Roads in Rear of German Advance Blocked by Columns of Troops, Guns and Transport Vehicles.

The Germans made attempts on Friday night to cross the Somme by means of four bridges, the attempts, however, were de-tected and frustrated with loss by the British artillery fire, his mes-

All the roads in the rear of the German advance, the despatch continues, are blocked by columns of troops, guns and transport vehicles, furnishing targets upon which the British artillery is maktween thirty and fifty per cent of all the enemy divisions, so faidentified.
