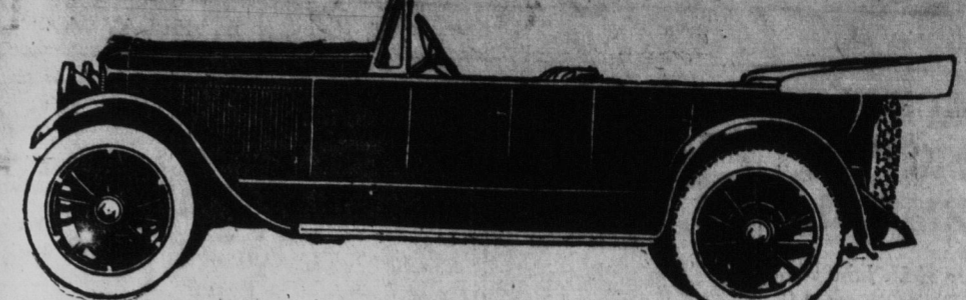

In fact, we have collected such a mass of interesting material we are publishing a book on the subject. We recently announced several of these local stunts. Here are a few more:

Climbing Uniontown Mt. "A Paige 6-66 stock car, with top up and loaded with five passengers, climbed Uniontown Mountain, out of Pittsburg, Pa., in high gear and finished a 26-minute grind without a sputter or miss. Never was the speed allowed to get above 10 miles an hour and once 70 hit 5. With the same passenger load a 20-mile-an-hour start the car averaged 30 miles an hour up and over the top. A newspaper observer, one of the passengers, described the effect as "that subtle something which seems to give one the impression of a

heroic stalling at the least, waiting for a chance to eat 'em up.' Brooklyn Has a Tough Test. "In Brooklyn, N. Y., climbing Miller Hill has been the topic of conversation between motor car salesmen and prospective customers since the inception of the automobile. Climbing this hill in high has been in later years the final test. It is about 260 feet long and has a grade of 18 1/2 per cent. It is difficult for a car to get a start because of street car and other traffic at the base. A Paige 6-66 took the hill in high, going over the top at 24 miles an hour. The Washington Test. "In Washington, D. C., the Thirty-fifth street hill offers a somewhat similar test. Moss grows between the flagging, which seldom feels the touch of hoof or wheel. The approach leads over the car tracks, a deep gutter and about 25 feet of 25 per cent grade. This 'hump' takes most of the speed out of a car before it reaches the 17 per cent of the hill proper. A Larchmont II with three passengers and top up was backed up to the curb directly across the street from the hill. Starting in second, the shift to top gear was made at the car track. The Larchmont II hit the curb, the gutter and the hump with only a 30-foot start and continued up the grade, topping the rise without faltering."

Poles Driven Out of Rosenberg By British

Not a Shot Fired by Latter in Taking Possession of City.

Oppeln, June 9.—Five thousand Polish insurgents have been driven out of the city of Rosenberg, northeast of this city, by British forces, and last night the Poles were reported to be retreating in a southeasterly direction. At that time many had passed the city of Zablinitz, about ten miles from Rosenberg. The Poles made a show of resistance, but the British did not fire a shot in taking possession of Rosenberg.

IRISH PLANNED TRADE TREATY WITH RUSSIANS

Pact Discovered When Raid Was Made on a Dublin Residence.

London, Jan. 9.—The government issued as a "white paper" this afternoon the text of what appears to be the draft of a proposed treaty between the Russian Soviet government and "the Republic of Ireland," which the government states was captured in Dublin. A covering letter, it was stated, captured at the same time signed "Derwent O'Higarty," described in the white paper as one of the Irish republican parliament's secretaries, addressed to Desmond Fitzgerald, Sinn Fein minister of propaganda. This letter is dated June 15, 1920.

AGREEMENT WRITTEN BY DR. McCARTAIN

Pledged Each Other to Help Each Other in Time of War.

The preamble of the alleged treaty is quoted as saying: "Dedulous of promoting peaceful and friendly relations between all nations, especially the peoples of Ireland and Russia, and striving to co-operate in the interest and advancement of the human race and for the liberation of all people from imperialistic exploitation and oppression, the government of the Russian Socialist Federal Soviet republic and the Republic of Ireland agree as follows: Pledge including Assistance. The fifteen articles of the treaty include pledges of the resources and influence of the two governments to promote the recognition and sovereignty of each other by the nations of the world; their efforts to prevent the transportation of arms, munitions and military supplies for use against each country, and a few commercial agreements."

Wants 50,000 Rifles.

"If I am sent," the memorandum continued, "I intend to ask for at least fifty thousand rifles to run into Ireland. I suggested this to their man here and he agreed it was a possibility." The memorandum adds: "I shall also discuss the question of hostages, that is, if England murders any of our soldiers, in or out of prison, they will agree to execute a Britisher as a reprisal.
