SALEM FIRE COST THREE LIVES AND \$12,000,000 LOSS

Salem, Mass., June 26—Measures for the relief of the 18,000 persons made homeless in yesterday's conflagration were proceeding with military precision tonight.

More than 8,000 were directly dependent upon the relief committee for shelter while 4,500 waited patiently in the various bread lines for the food which streamed into the city in abundance.

Those cared for in the tented camps were of the poorer class, mostly fire-fighters. An insurance adjuster who went carefully over the devastated district tonight, estimated the loss at \$12,000,000.
