FLEETING FOR LEE.
A special from Memphis says that the situation there could hardly be worse. Business is almost totally suspended. Thousands have fled, many shutting up their business houses, and abandoning their property. The chief ravages of the disease are confined to the portion of the city inhabited chiefly by poor people. There are many cases in south Memphis. The disease has entered nearly every door in the infected district. Whole families have died, and for a square on some streets there is not a house in which some body is not sick or has fallen a victim. The money generously sent from all quarters is being judiciously used to aid the sick and destitute and bury the dead. Assault on Shipboard—Hind—Another Assault—Stay of Proceedings.—"Jack"

The charge of assault against the captain of the brig *Hind* was concluded at the Police Court on Saturday. There were several lively scenes between the counsel during the progress of the trial, in which the captain joined. The assault was fully proven, and the Magistrate fined him \$20. This might have satisfied the captain but it did not, and when the mate went on board of the brig, which lies at the end of North Wharf, he was called into the cabin by him and again thrashed. The captain made a powerful effort, or else the mate a great call, as the latter of the captain's blows. John Kerr, Esq., counsel for the mate, applied to Judge Tapley and had a warrant issued for the captain's arrest, as the assault was supposed to have taken place in Portland.
The warrant was issued, but on Saturday night Sage, Gibson, of the Portland police force, received the following note:
Supt. Gibson—
Please do not execute warrant against the Captain of the *Hind*, as there is a dispute as to locality of assault and on other grounds. I don't want any quibble, mind, so that son of a gun Captain can escape.
JOHN KERR.
In deference to Mr. Kerr's wishes the warrant was not executed. Between Saturday night and this morning it was found by Mr. Kerr that the end of the Long Wharf was in the City. Of course it cannot be believed, as stated by some that it was measured and ascertained to be so on Sunday. Mr. Kerr would not, even to secure a case, allow such work to be done on Sunday; his moral feelings would at once banish the thought if it entered his head. This morning he, therefore, had information made before the City Police Magistrate, and the Captain will be arrested.
The Captain got wind of the warrant being issued this morning he and J. G. Forbes, Esq., appeared at the Portland Police Court. Mr. Kerr was sent for and refused to prosecute in that court and the case was dismissed. The Captain was delighted and so was Mr. Forbes. A Tribune reporter met the latter as he was leaving the court-room. His face was wreathed with smiles, and his eyes sparkled and danced with delight.
"Was your captain arrested?" was asked him. "Yes," said the learned counsel, "and discharged; no one would prosecute." "But he will be brought up in the City Court," "Not much," replied Mr. Forbes; "he can't be fined there for an assault committed in Portland. I guess I have fooled Jack this time."
The warrant is issued for the captain, who will be arrested, and a lively time may be expected when the counsel meet to fight the matter before the Magistrate. The great question is, where is the end of the Long Wharf, in the City or Portland; and it is possible that a special commission of enquiry will be appointed to ascertain.
