The M. W. the Grand Master delivered the following

**ADDRESS:**

BRETHREN,—

Those who were present at Halifax last year will well remember with what peculiar pleasure the cordial invitation to hold this Communication in Lunenburg was received.

The intervening time has all too quickly passed away, leaving I fear, many tasks unfinished, but enriched, I trust, with a fair record of honest work attempted and freighted with many precious memories of fraternal association. We started out with high aims and worthy resolves to do all our duty, and though here and there failures and mistakes are scored against us, let us cherish ever these "mementoes of our frailty" if they may but serve as warnings for the future. Let us strive to realize that even the weakest brother may, if his heart is right, deserve that success which he cannot command.

I greet you now for the first time in Lunenburg, welcoming you fraternally to this 33rd Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge.

The brethren of this lovely and romantic town, noted for its enterprise and prosperity, have long deserved well of Masonry.
