The West was revelling in 50 to 60 degrees of "don't feel it" last week.

St. Thomas had a net surplus of \$9,403 from hydro-electric power last year.

At Parkhill Edgar Robinson had three fingers of the right hand crushed in the mixer in the bakery.

Robert Kerr, of Dunwich township, died at his home, near Dutton, last week, where he was born 58 years ago.

Dunwich council has appointed D. W. Graham assessor and W. A. Galbraith and D. P. McCallum auditors.

Mrs. Somerville died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Wm. Purcell, near Rodney, last Thursday at the age of 98 years.

The Wardsville High School is beginning preparations for their annual concert which is to be given about the middle of February.

The Leap Year Social Club of Wardsville are having an assembly in the Town Hall there on Wednesday evening, January 26th.

Hardy's house in Alvinston is free from sickness at the present time. The country seems to be full of pneumonia and grippe cases.

Notices have been posted in the various church sheds in Forest requesting that the sheds be used only by persons who contribute towards their maintenance.

Orinam cheese factory made over 30 tons of cheese last year, against 27 tons the year before. The price of cheese during the entire season was good.

As a result of a recruiting meeting held on the Moravian Indian Reserve recently seventeen Indian braves of the reserve enlisted in the Middlesex Battalion.

The death occurred at the family residence, Caradoc, following a short illness, of Charles Ewart, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Rapley. Deceased was in his 21st year.

Elections in Brooke and Alvinston were not held this year and the money saved has been used to lease the music hall, which will be fitted with comforts for the soldiers.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bilton, of Euphemia, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding day last week, when their sons presented them with two leather-cushioned easy chairs.

Miss Lillian M. Elliott, a music teacher of Comber, was awarded \$450 damages and costs for injuries sustained when she was run down by an automobile driven by Geo. Grabs, of Buscombe, last June.

Aldborough municipal appointments:—E. A. Hugill, clerk, salary \$500; D. Lindsay, assessor, \$130; D. M. Campbell, collector, \$110; John Thompson and J. A. McKillop, auditors, \$45 each; D. McPherson, treasurer, \$150.

The farmers of Enniskillen in the various subdivisions of the township are signing up petitions, simultaneously, for estimates for hydro light and power for their farms. By this concerted action the whole township will, if the estimates are satisfactory, be embraced in the light and power zone.

The embargo against the exportation of horses has been withdrawn. The embargo was put on when the British Government was buying large quantities of horses for military purposes. That buying has been discontinued, and the embargo was raised in consequence. Horses may now be taken from Canada to the United States.

Twenty-eight head of cattle, fifty hogs, a large number of implements, and a considerable quantity of hay and grain, were destroyed in a fire which wiped out the barns of John Rundle, near St. Thomas, Monday morning.

Rundle himself, in a desperate effort to save his live stock, was nearly suffocated. The total loss is at least \$10,000.

With a good-sized bank-roll in his pocket, George Damper, of Chatham, went to Detroit. Half an hour after he had landed, a smooth stranger induced Damper to exchange his wad for a similar amount of Mexican bills.

Not until he attempted to make some purchases and the storekeeper refused to accept the Mexican money in payment, did the Chatham man discover that something had happened.

In an address at Trenton, Billy Sunday expressed his opinion of Germany and her allies in the following words:—"One thing I've got against Germany is that she has allied herself with the dirty, stinking, licentious, treacherous, vile, damnable Turks. If ever you hear me say a good word about them you can kick me out of my job. They are spewing and committing vice and murder in Christian lands and slaughtering millions of Christian Armenians. They are torturing men, ruining women, butchering babies. It is horrible, hellish."

Police Court.

Two interesting cases were heard at the Glencoe court room on Thursday.

Before D. C. McKenzie, police magistrate, Bessie Smith, wife of a London soldier, brought action against Roy Goff for alleged indecent assault while the latter was driving her from Glencoe to the home of her friends in Moss.

The case was dismissed on the woman's own evidence after cross-examination by J. C. Elliott, defendant's lawyer.

Before Squire Chittick John and James Curry were fined \$3 and costs each for assault on J. D. McNaughton, of Moss.

LEVY FOR PATRIOTIC WORK

Middlesex County Council Will Be Asked to Do This.

A special meeting of the Glencoe Patriotic Association held on Tuesday evening, a committee was appointed with a view of arranging with the various other patriotic associations of the county of Middlesex to have a delegation wait upon the county council asking that all patriotic, Red Cross and Belgian and other relief contributions for the entire county of Middlesex be made by special taxes, levied by the county council.

The committee purposes getting into touch with the various centres in the county and arranging for a strong delegation to wait upon the county council at its meeting next week.

The feeling in the rural districts is strongly opposed to the voluntary contribution system that has prevailed in the past, the general opinion being that it is ineffective and unsatisfactory.

Similar action is being taken at St. Thomas and Windsor. On Tuesday night at St. Thomas the city council granted the Elgin Patriotic Association \$30,000, and the city will apply for legislation giving authority to tax every male citizen, not on the tax roll, \$5 for patriotic purposes.

The clerk was granted \$10 for extra services in connection with the local option by-law and for distributing the same.

Council adjourned to Monday evening, February 7th.

Melbourne Agricultural Society.

The annual meeting of the members of the Melbourne Agricultural Society was held in the Woodmen's Hall, Melbourne, on Monday afternoon, and was well attended. A readable statement was presented by the secretary-treasurer, showing a good balance from last year's work.

Graham; second vice-president, Francis Howe; directors—Malcolm McNeil, Henry McCracken, James Sutherland, Thomas Carruthers, H. A. Fletcher, Cyrus McTaggart, J. B. Cornell, David Hardy, H. D. A. McKenzie; auditors—Gilbert Hyndman, J. W. McKenzie; secretary-treasurer, Frank McLean.

The date of the fall fair for 1916 was set for the first Wednesday in October.

Mrs. Parsons will address the Women's Institute of Middlesex in the Methodist church in the afternoon, and a joint meeting of the Women's and Farmers' Institutes in the evening.
