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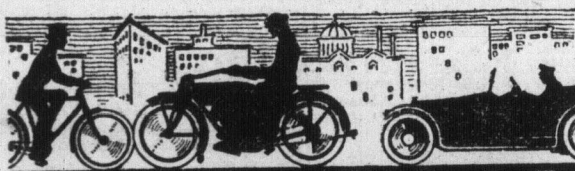

**T E RENTED HOUSE**  
I'm sure for the poor rented house, it stands between two happy houses whose owners live in them. Spring has brought a new coat of paint for the owned house on one side and the owned house on the other, is having a new veranda built to it.

There has been a gardener working all day on the box hedge which runs round the owned house on the right; the same box hedge used to run round the rented house also, but that was years ago. The last remnant of it was torn out for a bonfire one day. **GROWING MISTLETOE**  
Why not? Mistletoe commands good prices at Christmastide, and to cultivate it artificially is a by no means difficult job.

Choose a young bough with fresh, smooth bark, and rub fully-ripe mistletoe berries on the under side gently until most of the substance of each berry is rubbed away, leaving only sufficient to enable the seed to adhere to the bark.

The latter end of February or early March is the best time for this operation, and once performed the graft may be left to look after itself, no further care or attention being needful. In about 12 months the radicle will have taken a firm hold, and the green leaves will begin to show themselves.

As regards the choice of the tree, this matters little within certain limits. There are in England about 20 species of trees capable of producing mistletoe, including such common ones as the apple, pear, ash, lime, willow, almond, fir and oak. But care should be taken not to select for the experiment a too valuable tree. For the mistletoe is a parasite, and lives by sucking up the juices of the tree to which it is attached. The mistletoe plant, if left to its own devices, will not infrequently kill the tree which nourishes it, thereby itself committing suicide.—The Bits.
