

## Fledgling CFS given runaround

ĐTTAWA (CUP) - It was not a good start for a fledgling student
organization organization.

After a five-day founding conference in which delegates Students, provincial student organizations, and the Association of Student Councils merged to form the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS), a long-awaited lobby effort fell flat

discuss the proposed $\$ 1.5$ billion cuts in Established Programs Financing (EPF), the plan through which the federal govern ment transfers money to the provinces for social welfare and recently named Secretary of State and is responsible for post secondary education
