- March 6 Defence Headquarters announced that while the composition of the first Canadian Army was mixed in Canadian units, all personnel are Canadians and reinforcements are provided by Canadians through Canadian reinforcement depots in the respective theatres.
- March 7 The Honourable A.G.L. McNaughton said that throughout 1944 reinforcements "were adequate in total numbers" although they were not always where they were wanted", etc.
- March 7 Major General G.R. Pearkes issued a statement branding as "utterly false and slanderous" the charge of the Honourable J. G. Gardiner re politics.
- March 7 C. H. Millard, C.C.F. member for York West (prov.) said, on his return from England that the barracks of Canadian reserve units behind the fighting front overseas were "overcrowded with reinforcements when he visited them a few days ago."
- March 8
 Recruiting figures show that in the six weeks ended
 March 10, 10,813 men enlisted in the army, a new high
 compared with similar periods during the last six
 months.
- March 8 Major General F. F. Worthington has been appointed General Officer Commanding, Pacific Command.
- March 8 Major General G. R. Pearkes is retiring from the Canadian Army.
- March 12 Major General G. R. Turner has been appointed Inspector General for Western Canada.
- March 13 Defence Headquarters announced the award of the United States' Legion of Merit to Major General A. E. Walford of Montreal and Brigadier Churchill Mann of Toronto.
- March 12 General McNaughton said in Toronto that when Canadian overseas troops were sent to Italy the situation was so advanced in England that there was nothing to do but go ahead with a Canadian Army.
