STRAWBERRY JAM.

Centains Glucose, Acids, Hayseeds, and Minister Brodeur Is After its Manufacturers.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—Hon. L. R. Brodeur, Minister of Inland Revenue, gave some facts to the House yesterday that may curb the hankering of fastidious mem-bers of the community for jams, jellies, serious manual properties. bers of the community for jams, jellies, spices, maple syrup and sundry other delicacies. Adulteration has come to be the steady practice of the manufacturer. Since Mr. Brodeur began his crusade against the evil-deers, an improvement is noticeable in jams and jellies, but to use the Minister's words, the adulteration of spices is horrible. Glucose, acetic acid, and hayseeds are the popular ingredients of the delicacy.

Glucose, acetic acid, and bayseeds are the popular ingredients of the delicacy labelled strawberry jam. A great deal of the raspberry jam we are consuming appears to be largely the product of a skilful manipulation of apple pulp.

An Aggressive Policy.

The Minister promised to pursue an aggressive policy towards those who violate the act. From samples of food and iliquors which he has examined, it has been found that iliquor alone is pure. Mr. Brodeur did not draw the obvious moral from the result of his enquiries. His solution of the difficulty is to demand the pure thing from the manufacturers as well as from the dismanufacturers as well as from the die of the estimates, Mr. Brodeur stated that the metric system is steadily growing in popularity, and it may be adopted in the course of a year or so. Adjutant Bloss Gives Splendid Address on Pioneer Work in the Klondyke

Adjutant Bloss delivered a very ateresting and instructive lecture to a large and appreciative audience at

interesting and instructive lecture to a large and appreciative audience at the Salvation Army burraces upon the Army's Pioneer Work in the Klondike on Thursday night. In the absence of Rev. Mr. Malo't, who was unavoidably detained on account of sinkness, the chair was taken by Mr. Daniel Jordan.

The Adjutant related very vividly his travels in the far North. He was one of the Jioneer officers of Miss Booth's jarty who crossed the Chilootte Pars in 1898, the Jarty consisting of eight members, two of whom were women nurses. The cost of outfitting the expedition was \$4,000 and it took two months to reach Dawson City.

The whole tri; was given in detail by the Adjutant; the crossing of the Greaf Divide, carrying their tents, provisions, boats, etc., on their backs; rowing five hundred miles in canoes acroes lakes, down rivers, through dangerous rajids, cutting down their own timber and building the barracks, sawing their own lumber out of the logs for doors, window frames, etc.; jutting up a poor men's shelter where they cared for many an unfortunate during the cold winter.

A free Christmas dinner of roast beef and plum pudding was given to 300 poor hungry men; many were found starving, and the officers would go and visit and pray with the siek in their lonely cabins and in the frozen cemetery.




