Ottawa, April 18.—Before the orders yesterday, the Opposition again had a vely time with the Acting Minister of Public Works re the contract for redging Port Arthur Harbor, Mr. Bennett, of East Simcoe, moved the ad-journment in order to bring the matter journment in order to bring the matter ventilated last Thursday up again. He said the terms of the new advertises ment were no better than the old. The department was asking for tenders for \$200,000 worth of work at practically twe days' notice, thus cutting off all possible competition. In this matter restrictions were such that only one firm, that of Commee and Bowman, one

arm, that or Connee and Bowman, one a member of the House and other other of the Previncial Legislature, could possibly tender.

"It is falle to say," continued Mr. Bennett, "that Mr. Connee is not interested," terested in this firm. This question of trafficking—for that is its real name— has been before this House before and has been before this House before and the member for Rainy River did not dare get up/and deny that he had not interest in the firm of Commee and Bowman. I understand the gentleman in question was in this city last week. He has not dared to come here and make a public denial."

Mr. Bennett closed by claiming a new tender should be called.

And what "the Acting Minister should do was to have competition among Canadian confractors." Acting Minister should do was to have competition among Canadian contractors and allow the successful tenderer to get his dredge where he pleased. In fact, during the course of the debate it had been pointed out that the very dredges evidently selected for this work had been purchased on the American side.


