Synopsis of Canadian North-West.

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

A NY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, ex-cepting 8 and 25, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any per-son who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 150 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy, may, however, be made at any Agency on certain condi-tions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader.

DUTIES. - (1) At least six months' residence upon and cul-tivation of the land in each year three vears.

for three vents. (2) A homestender may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eight (80) acree in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint owner-ship in land will not meet this re-ouirgement. quirement.

quirement. (3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the acove while living with jarents or on farm-ing land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of nucle intertion. such intention.
