This is one of the finest of the famous lake shore farms, and is situated near the street car terminus at Oshawa Harbor, outside town limits. The land is of excellent quality, is in a good state of cultivation, and is very productive. For more than thirty years a large herd of pure-bred Ayrshires, and pure-bred sheep and swine, have been kept on the farm, large crops being annually raised and principally fed on the premises. The fields are well laid out; the outbuildings are ample; the house is excellent, of brick, well built, well furnished within and without, and is heated by a furnace. The house is surrounded by a beautiful lawn and ornamental grounds, and the farm includes a large orchard of apple trees in thrifty condition and full bearing, and also containing a large number of small fruits, including plums, currants, raspberries, etc. The view from the house is one of the most beautiful in the Province, overlooking Lake Ontario to the south and the town of Oshawa to the north. The water supply is ample. The permanent pastures on this farm are noted for their luxuriant growth and nutritious qualities. On account of the proprietor's death this estate must be sold. The usual amount of fall plowing has been done on the farm.

The Canadian Horse Show for 1898.

The FARMER'S ADVOCATE is glad to announce that the Canadian Horse Show for 1898 has been decided upon and will be held in the Armories Building, Toronto, from May 4th to 7th, inclusive. An attractive military tournament is to be held in conjunction therewith. The date is a few days later than last year, and earlier would have answered breeding horses rather better, but it was only for the days named that arrangements could be effected with the military people. An exceedingly liberal prize list, corresponding in the main to that of last year, has been arranged, and will shortly be issued by the Secretary, Mr. Hy. Wade, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. As in previous years, no effort will be spared to make the Show an immense success, and by all odds the most notable of the year from the horseman's standpoint. The very decided revival which is now taking place in horse-breeding will naturally add keen interest to the Show, attracting large numbers from outside points.

Live Stock Shipping Rates to the West.

The Secretary of the Cattle, Sheep and Swine Breeders' Associations is issuing a circular to breeders, importers and exporters, giving detailed information regarding the modified classification for Ontario, and the reduced freight rates granted by the leading railways for the transportation of registered stock from the east to Manitoba, the Northwest, and British Columbia. The classification of weights for age of cattle is the same as published in the FARMER'S ADVOCATE for March 15th, 1897, and is as moderate as could reasonably be asked for. The rate for a carload of 20,000 pounds from any point in Ontario or Quebec west of Montreal to Winnipeg is \$72 per carload; to Regina, \$90; to Calgary, \$114, and corresponding rates to all Western points. Parties wishing to ship single animals from any point in Ontario to Manitoba and the West may do so at carload rates by corresponding with the Secretary of the Associations, and as soon as enough animals to fill the car are offered the car will be forwarded in charge of a suitable attendant. The price charged for the transportation of such animals will be about \$13 per head for cattle to Winnipeg, to Regina about \$15, and to Calgary about \$18. The above rates are approximate. Young cattle, sheep, and swine will be carried at proportionate rates. A carload of pure-bred stock may now be sent to New Westminster, B. C., for \$251. Mixed carloads may be shipped at the above rates. The C. P. R. has recently granted the following additional concessions to shippers of pure-bred stock to Manitoba and the Northwest: A mixed carload of pure-bred live stock and settlers' effects may now be carried at the above reduced rates, provided that the goods and live stock (other than the pure-bred animals) are for a bona fide settler who is going to Manitoba or the Northwest for the purpose of taking up land and farming thereon. To obtain this privilege special arrangements must be made, which can be done by corresponding with the Secretary. We have quoted only the leading points in the circular, which is lengthy, and can be had on application to the Secretary, F. W. Hodson, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

GOSSIP.

IMPORTED CLYDESDALE STALLIONS.

Messrs. Henderson & Dalgetty advertise in this issue four imported Clydesdale stallions, including the very superior young horse, Goldfinder 2nd, rising three, winner of first prize at the Toronto Spring Show, 1897; also second at the Toronto Industrial and first and championship at the Western Fair at London the same year. In the new importation is the big, flash Prosperous (10263), rising 3, own brother to the unbeaten yearling, Prince Kureka. Prosperous won 3rd at the Royal Show at Manchester, fourth at the Scottish Stallion Show at Glasgow, and second at Greenock. He was sired by Maines o' Airies and out of Carina, by Craigmores Darnley, and has great substance, good feet, and a good quality of bone. Also in this importation comes Royal Fred, by Prince Frederick, out of the dam of the well-known breeding horse, Knight o' Lothian (1489), and of him the Scottish Farmer says: "He is a useful, breeding-like horse; and if he does as well in Canada as his uterine brother did in Scotland, he will be a profitable investment for all concerned." He is rising four, and is a strong and well-proportioned horse, with grand feet and legs and good action. The fourth is the aged and well-known imported horse, Reform, by Prince Albert Victor, winner of 23 first prizes in Canada, and a proved sire of excellent stock of a good selling sort. These horses are kept at James Henderson's farm, Belton, Ont., two miles from Kelly's Sliding station, G. T. R., midway between London and St. Mary's.

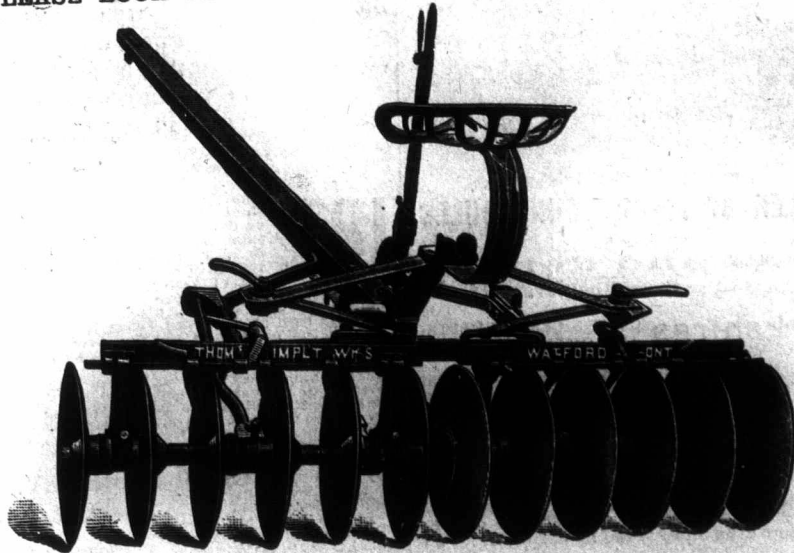
HUNT & COLTER'S CLYDESDALES.
The Clydesdale stallions which are offered in another column by Messrs. Hunt & Colter, of Brantford, are worthy of the attention of parties in whose sections good, well-bred stock is in demand. 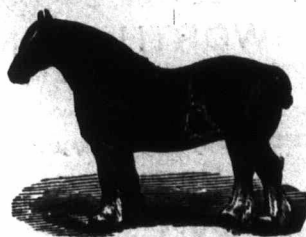
