On motion of Mr. M. Nider, seconded by Mr. Malbiot,

The House adjourned till Monday next.

## Monday, 23d November, 1795.

R. Speaker and the House went up at the hour appointed to the Castle of Saint Lewis, with the address of this House to his Excellency the Governor General—And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported; that the House had attended his Excellencywith their address, to which his Excellency had been pleased to return the following answer:

GENTLEMEN.

HAVE great pleasure in receiving your assurances of a ready concurrence in every measure that can contribute to the good of His. Majesty's service, and the happiness and prosperity of his Subjects in this Province.

Then, on motion of Mr. De Bonne, seconded by Mr. Lynd, The House adjourned till Wednesday next.

## Wednesday, 25th November 1795.

RAD the order of the day for the second reading of the bill, for indemnifying all persons who have been concerned in advising and carrying into execution, an order, or Proclamation of the Governor in Council, of the ninth of September last, respecting an embargo on all vessels laden or to be laden, in whole or in part, with wheat; peas, oats, barley, indian corn, flour and Bisquit, for preventing suits in contequence of the same and for making surther provision relative thereto.

And the faid bill was read for the second time.

On motion of Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Frobisher,

Resolved, that this House will resolve itself into a committee of the whole house, on Wednesday next, upon the said bill.

And then on motion of Mr. Taschereau, seconded by Mr. Marcoux, The House adjourned till Friday next.
