Mr. Crane, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the Address of the House upon the subject of the Bye Road Appropriations, reported that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would make the necessary communication to His Majesty's Council in order that the wishes of the House in this respect should be complied with.

A Message from His Majesty's Council.

Mr. Baillie delivered the following Message:—

“ Mr. Speaker,—I am directed to inform the House that the Council have agreed to the following Bills :—

“ A Bill to apply a part of the Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services.

“ A Bill for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges.

“ A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.”

And then Mr. Baillie withdrew.

The House then adjourned until Saturday morning next at 12 o'Clock.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House of Assembly. The House attended in obedience to His Excellency's command ; and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that he had addressed His Excellency to the effect following :—

“ *May it please Your Excellency.*

“ The House of Assembly have made liberal provision for the Public Service of the current year : they now tender for your Excellency's acceptance, the several Bills of Appropriation passed during the present Session, and pray your Excellency's assent thereto. They feel confident that the Grants placed at your Excellency's disposal, will be so expended as to realize to the fullest extent, all the benefits which the House in making them have anticipated.”

And that His Excellency was then pleased to give his assent to the following Bills :—

“ A Bill to continue and amend the Revenue Laws of the Province.

“ A Bill to apply a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services of the Province.

“ A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.

“ A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

“ A Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, to raise a sum of money for completing the Court House in the said City and County.

“ A Bill to continue and amend the Act for the better securing of the Navigation of the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy.

“ A Bill relative to the Streets and Squares in the City of Saint John.

“ A Bill to continue until the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, certain Acts, providing for the more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of Saint John, and to amend the same.

“ A Bill to authorize the Justices of the County of Gloucester, to assess the said County, for erecting a Court House and Gaol therein.

“ A Bill to authorize the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, to open a Street from the Wharf on the South side of the Market Slip, to the Wharf owned by Charles J. Peters, Esquire.
