MILK ADVANCED IN PRICE

Going into effect to-day milk vendors have advanced the price of the article from 12 to 14 cents per quart retail in for larceny before. This is a steep figure, especially for the poorer people, with large families, to pay, but farmers say that the cost of feeds has reached an abnormal figure and to keep cattle under present conditions is a great expense, so that they were compelled to raise the price to the figure quoted.

The schr. Mildred B. arrived at Channel from Sydney yesterday coal laden.

The S.S. North Cambria cleared at Gambo for Barry Roads with 2,561 cords of pit props.

A young man of a northern outfit, ill of diphtheria, was transferred from a schooner to hospital this morning.

THE SUSU HERE.

The S.S. Susu, Capt. Roberts, arrived here at 7 a.m. yesterday with a full freight of fish oil, etc. The ship had a N.E. gale with heavy sea and going north could not make Tilting or Joe Batt's Arm, it being too rough to land at these places. It was more civil on the return. Her passengers were Capt. S. R. Winsor, Isaac Thomson, T. Martin, J. McGinn, Misses E. Wilson, Spencer (2), M. Gooby, B. Young, Squires (2) and Mesdames Spencer and Squires, with several steerage.

THE S.S. STEPHANO HERE

The S.S. Stephano, Capt. Smith, arrived here at 8 a.m. to-day after a good run from New York and Halifax, the weather being moderate all the way. Mr. Jones, the chief steward, has taken a holiday, and second steward C. Snow takes his place. The ship brought a full freight with a deck cargo of oil and her passengers were, besides 13 round trippers: A. S. Baldwin, W. S. Monroe, E. Howell, J. Peters, J. V. O'Dear, J. N. Grant and 10 second class.

HEAVY THUNDER AND LIGHTNING

The Susu reports that there was no wreckage in Bonavista Bay as a result of the big storm of Sunday night week, but at Greenspond and neighbourhood the rain fell in torrents and about the worst electrical storm experienced there in years occurred. The lightning was very vivid with terrific thunder and a gale of wind prevailed, but it was nothing like that experienced here.

AN OLD VIKING.

Capt. Isaac Bartlett, of Bay Roberts, goes in the schr. "L. H. B.," fish-laden for G. M. Barr to the Mediterranean. Capt. Bartlett has the blood of the old Vikings in his veins. He has been ashore for several years, but the love of the sea was too strong for him and he now will face old ocean and brave wind and storm in an avocation which has always appealed to his family.

HERE SEEKING CODFISH

There arrived here by the S.S. Stephano to-day three Spanish business men who had been at Nova Scotia buying codfish. They will buy a considerable quantity here for shipment to Spain either by steamer or train and will give liberal figures.

Drive at Lemberg Renewed by Russians

PETROGRAD, Oct. 1.—The Russian drive at Lemberg was renewed yesterday, after a period of comparative quiet. The Russians made a strong offensive on the Germans north and south of the Galician capital. According to to-day's War Office report, material success has been won. It is said that more than 4,000 prisoners were taken, the Teutonic forces offering bitter resistance.

"Maywood" Sunk

LONDON, Oct. 1.—The British steamer Maywood, 1,188 tons, has been sunk and the crew saved.

THE EAGLE RETURNS

The S.S. Eagle, Capt. Couch, arrived here from Halifax Saturday night with a full general cargo to Bowring Bros. after a good run down and after having made the round trip in eight days. The ship, which left here on the 23rd ult., was out in Sunday night's storm and being light, in ballast, received a bad drubbing but proved to be a splendid sea boat and came through it all without damage. Despite this bad weather she made the run up in 70 hours. She has over 400 barrels flour and is discharging at Shea & Co's.

THE TERRA NOVA HERE

The S.S. Terra Nova, Capt. W. J. Kennedy, arrived here at 3.30 p.m. yesterday, coal laden from Sydney to Crosbie & Co. The S.S. Terra Nova has been plying all summer with pit props, mostly from Alexander Bay to Cardiff, and on her last run this way from the latter port came out to Cape Race in 12 days, reaching Sydney last Sunday. She was three days on the run from Sydney here owing to the prevalence of fog all the way.

GOT 6 MONTHS.

To-day the man M. Connors, who attacked Mrs. James Dodd on Freshwater Road Thursday night last, and attempted to steal her purse, was before Court. After the evidence of two young chaps who saw the affair was taken, he was convicted and sentenced by Mr. Hutchings, K.C. to 6 months imprisonment, without the option of a fine.

HURT BY EXPLOSION.

Friday a lad named Gregory Taylor, of Central Street, came by some powder, which he placed in a paper bag and ignited with a match. The result was an explosion which severely injured one of his hands, while he was also hurt about the face and eyes and had to be attended by a doctor.

LOST 450 QTLS. FISH.

The two schooners lost at Marystown as the result of the big storm had on board 450 qtls. of codfish owned by the Marystown Trading Co. One of the schooners was dashed to pieces quickly and the other is submerged to the deck. The fish was uninsured, and a great loss to the owners.

SEARCHING FOR MISSING SCHR.

The Reid Mtd. Co.'s S.S. "Wren" left Trinity at 3 p.m. Saturday to search for the missing schr. Harry D. M. Joseph Morris, master. It is feared by many that the craft was lost with all hands in the big storm of Sunday week, though no wreckage has been found on the coast.

OFF TO FRANCE.

A message was received by Mrs. Goss, of New Gower Street, Saturday night, saying that the contingent of our boys now at Ayre are leaving immediately for active service in France.


