Splendid Seamanship Won Fight

Accurate Firing Also Played Big Part in Destruction of German Craft A-6.

Rotterdam, May 4.—The first detailed story of how the British mine-sweeping trawler Mauri rammed the German destroyer A-6 was told here to-day.

By magnificent seamanship, the trawler, while heavy fire was being exchanged, rammed the destroyer as it drew alongside. The latter was struck exactly amidships and the bridge crashed overboard, five officers and men falling into the sea. The Mauri, apparently, was undamaged.

THREE MEN PERISH

Of the five men thrown into the sea one was picked up by the Mauri, another, an officer, was rescued by a boat from the Norwegian steamer Varilde, and the other three perished.

The duel lasted for twenty minutes, during which there was a constant exchange of shots between the German and the British.

An eyewitness of the fight, the second mate of the Norwegian steamer, says the firing from the gun on the mine-sweeper was superior to that of the destroyer. There were several direct hits on the latter and scores of shots fell in the water close alongside.

It was a running fight, the destroyer giving chase to the mine-sweeper when it saw it in company with two others.

The destroyer began the firing, but there was an immediate reply from the trawler. The latter was gradually overhauled and it looked as if she

was doomed.

Then the captain of the trawler played his trump card.

As the German warship drew to the level, preparing to fire a torpedo, the trawler's helm was put hard over and she crashed head on into the destroyer. The bridge fell over the side and five men dropped into the sea.

The destroyer had had enough and just turned around, and without waiting to pick up any of her men, made off as fast as it could in the direction of Zeebrugge without firing another shot.
