Brantford has the honor of entertaining to-day and hearing to-night, one of Canada's most gifted sons, Professor Stephen Buller Leacock, B.A., Ph.D. who will give one of his celebrated "talks" from his well known humorous works in Victoria Hall. He comes here as the guest of the Women's Patriotic League, entirely without fee or expense, the proceeds of the evening going to the Belgium and Red Cross funds. Professor Leacock has had a most distinguished career. He was educated at Upper Canada College and at Toronto University, of which he is a graduate. He took his Ph. D. degree at the University of Chicago, was Master at Upper Canada College from 1891 to 1899 and is at the present time head of the department of Political Economy at McGill University. He made a tour of the Empire 1907 to 1908 giving lectures on Imperial organization under the auspices of the Cecil Rhodes trusts. As an author, he has an international reputation. Amongst his publications are "Elements of Political Science," "Baldwin and Lafontaine," "Literary Tapes," "Nonsense Novels," "Sunshine Sketches of a Little Town." He is undoubtedly Canada's greatest writer of refined humor although equally at home in the higher walks of criticism and research. As an essayist too, he ranks very high indeed. It will be a big treat, that Brantfordites will have this evening in hearing such a distinguished man.

Methodist Conference at Hamilton

Hamilton, June 3.—The ministerial session of the Hamilton Methodist Conference opened yesterday afternoon in First Church, Rev. Dr. H. W. Crews, Woodstock, presiding, and Rev. T. W. Poole, Hamilton, Secretary. Jubilee addresses were given by Rev. Thomas Amy, and Rev. J. Parker Bell, and by Rev. Thomas Jeffries who has been in the ministry seventy years.

LAYMEN'S OPPORTUNITY The Laymen's Association met in the school room last evening, E. H. Claver, Burlington, President, in the chair. Referring to the war, he said it afforded a rare opportunity for laymen to evangelize the world, and urged it as the duty of Methodists to do all in their power to secure prohibition of the liquor traffic.

PROGRESS DURING YEAR Controller Morris, Secretary, presented the statistical report, telling of progress made during the year. In Conference now were 200 ministers, 60 superannuated ministers, 40 probationers, 5,233 officials, 5,212 teachers, and 5,000 trustees, making a total of 13,845. Church properties were valued at \$3,728,905. The total membership was 256,320, an increase of 942. The total raised for all purposes last year was \$811,417, an increase of \$69,780. Addresses were delivered by Rev. G. L. McIrvine, J. S. Harker and Rev. P. W. Philpott.

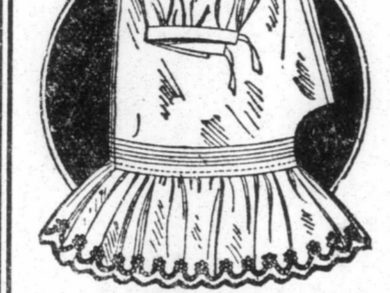
