A PETITION. Hon. Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, Executive Mansion,

Washington, D.C. Mr. President,-I, the undersigned, a citizen of the United States of America, respectfully petition you, in the cause of humanity and justice, to call an extra session of Congress at once, to invest you with the power to place an embargo on all arms and ammuni. tion and in this way to help to bring to an end the present European war which is rapidly demoralizing our industries and commerce in non-contraband merchandise.
