WAR MANIAC WHOSE BLOOD HAS BEEN LET

Such is Germany, According to Correspondent—Her Huge Casualty List. New York, Nov. 8.—Germany's enormous losses at the fighting—chiefly on the Russian front—toward the close of September, losses since doubled, if not trebled, by the offensive campaign against Serbia, are the subject of comment in a letter published yesterday from Horace Green, special correspondent of the evening Post written from Berlin on Oct. 3. Mr. Green writes: "To-day Germany is like a feverish patient to whom the leech has been applied—the war maniac whose blood has been drained, worked for some time trying to get the proper figures of this blood-letting."

I found the answer on the walls and corridors and written in the files of the War Office just around the corner from the Neue Wilhelmstrasse. Here the casualty lists have been compiled up to Oct. 2. By the newspapers, which are not much more than official bulletins, there is little said about the extent of the losses, and the War Office neither calculates nor publishes their figures. In fact, copying and republishing the lists in German papers is strictly forbidden. But for the names of friends and relatives the names of individual dead, wounded, and missing are systematically and honestly posted each day during severe fighting.

The German casualties for the single week ended Oct. 1, were 61,955. In other words 61,955 German citizens or more than 8,850 a day, have been killed, wounded or taken prisoner during the last seven days of Russian warfare. Since it takes a week or more to compile the reports from the front these figures can have no connection with the great fight of this week along the western front, where, during the renewed English-French offensive it is said that the losses were three times greater than any similar period of the war.

The seven days from Sept. 23 to 30, inclusive, were not above the average of the past two months. I took the figures because they were the latest and the most easily available. On each column were two names, thus: Johann Schmidt, Carl Broedinger, Rudolf Haenker; and after each name, "slightly wounded (severely wounded missing, dead)." In Sept. 30 there were seventy-two columns of names, making a total of 8,540 losses. On Sept. 29, there were sixty columns, giving 7,200 names; and the losses for the other days of the week, from Sept. 28, 9,000; Sept. 27, 8,625; Sept. 26, no list posted; Sept. 25, 7,080; Sept. 24, 8,810; Sept. 23, 8,700.

CANUCKS HAVE HAD A WEEK OF HEAVY RAIN

Report From the Front Shows Several Officers and Men Have Earned Medals. Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Major-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes last night received the following despatch from the Canadian general representative in France:

Canadian General Headquarters in France, Nov. 7.—The period from Oct. 30 to Nov. 5 has been marked by the action of heavy rain. Creeks and streams have swollen into small rivers and low-lying grass has been converted into swamp. The wet weather and conditions generally have resulted in a week almost devoid of unusual incident. At times the enemy artillery has shelled certain sections of our area more or less vigorously, but in most instances prompt retaliation by our artillery has silenced the hostile fire.

On Oct. 29 a shell from our artillery exploded a bomb depot in the German front trench. All reports indicate that the enemy working parties have been particularly busy repairing damage to their trenches caused by the heavy rains, and are bailing out the water. On several occasions hostile working parties have been dispersed by our fire. A few enemy patrols have ventured out at night to repair the German wire entanglements, but in the majority of instances our patrols succeeded in locating them and driving them back to their trenches.

On Nov. 4 an enemy aeroplane was brought to earth between the opposing front line trenches. Pursued and attacked by three British airmen while flying over our area and heavily shelled by our anti-aircraft guns, the German machine suddenly capsized, and turning over three times in the air crashed to the ground.

Lieut. A. W. North, of the 28th Western Canada battalion, has been awarded the Military Cross for gallantry on the occasion of the explosion of a German mine on Oct. 8th, and Pte. B. Crompton, of the 28th Battalion, has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal in connection with the same affair.

Sergeant C. Ryer, of the 26th N.W. Brunswick battalion, has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for bringing in a severely wounded man under heavy fire on Oct. 13th.

Lieut. J. G. Anderson, of the 5th Western Canadian battalion, has been awarded the Military Cross for useful and daring reconnaissances.
