LIBERALS' PET THEORY EXPLODED.

The Toronto Telegram (Independent) explodes the Liberal theory, that a reduction of duty reduces the cost of an article to the consumer, in this effective way:—

"The fact is that the removal of the duty of fifty cents a ton on anthracite coal did not reduce the price of hard coal to the Canadian consumer."
"The theory is that to take the duty off soft coal would be to reduce the price of soft coal by the amount of the duty."

"A beautiful theory, but it did not work out in the experiment with the duty on hard coal."

"The price of anthracite was not reduced by the removal of the duty. The price to the Canadian consumer remained as it was, and the Pennsylvania producer pocketed the fifty cents a ton duty which had hitherto gone into the Dominion Treasury."

"Better keep the duty on soft coal and apply the proceeds towards the deficit incurred by carrying Nova Scotia coal on the Intercolonial Railway. The fear of having to meet Nova Scotia coal on the American market will do more than the removal of the duty to keep down the price of soft coal."

SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

The Department of Education is advocating the introduction of an important feature into the public schools of Ontario which would prove a lasting benefit to the children of our Province. It is the establishment of a library in each school of books specially suitable for the pupils, that they may cultivate early in life the taste for good reading. The school days of our boys and girls is the most impressionable time of their lives. It is then they eagerly seek after books to gratify a seemingly unquenchable thirst for adventure, history, travel, etc., and they run through an amazing mass of literature, much of which is valueless and even harmful. It is therefore the important duty of some one to guide and direct the choice of their reading, for what is then read affects all subsequent educational efforts.

The Educational Department believes this can best be done by the provision of a school library under the direction of the teacher, who, knowing his pupils and their requirements, is best fitted to fulfil that duty.

The library would be graded with careful selections for the younger ones dealing with stories of a high order and books on nature, elementary science, history and geography. This gives the pupil a variety as well as sharpening his mental appetite. Supplementary reading holds a prominent place in the modern system of education, and editions of English classics could readily be procured at a small cost.

Enterprising teachers may act on this excellent suggestion of the Department of Education and establish a library for his or her school. Copies of regulations and all information will be sent by the Minister on application and also a well prepared catalogue of books graded and classified along with publisher's name and price.

It is not too much to expect that by this means the dime novel will cease to be such an obstacle as heretofore in the development of character among children.—St. Thomas Journal.


