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MINE OWNERS AIMED AT

Haywood's Defence Say Conspiracy Can Be Proven.

Pinkerton's Men Involved—Vindicator Mine Explosion Accidental—How the Revolver Was Fixed—Orchard's Account Severely Attacked—Witnesses Testify as to His Threats Against Steunenberg.

Boise, Idaho, June 29.—The effort of the defence to open the way for a showing of a general conspiracy extending over many states on the part of the mine owners to crush out the Western Federation of Miners has now become one of the interesting features of the trial of Wm. D. Haywood. The state is resisting this very earnestly.

So Judge Wood has ruled that evidence showing a conspiracy in the States of Idaho and Colorado will be admitted on the promise that the defence has not given up their effort to widen the field and yesterday the struggle was resumed.

The counter conspiracy and not the discrediting of Orchard has now come to the forefront. W. B. Easterly who as a member of the famous Altman Union No. 19 of Cripple Creek, was on the strike committee and who Orchard swore was one of the men with whom he made the arrangement, had contradicted every statement Orchard made connecting him with the Independence Depot or the Vindicator Mine.

Clarence Darrow, who is conducting the defence, asserts positively that he proposes to go, directly if possible, into the conspiracy of the mine owners and claims if he succeeds in broadening the scope he will be able to prove that a widespread conspiracy exists.

Thomas Wood, a miner, testifying for the defence, said that he was in the Vindicator mine on the eighth level at the time of the explosion. He said he saw a revolver hanging loose from Beck's pocket, half an hour before the explosion.

He had left a box of dynamite in the shaft on the eighth level. When he reached the shaft of the eighth level after the explosion the powder was gone. When he reached the sixth level he found fragments of a revolver on the ground by the bodies of Beck and McCormick. The defence is seeking to show that the explosion was an accident.

W. Easterly and C. D. Copley both swore that they heard Orchard mention his loss in the Hercules Mine, and Easterly contended that he did not know Steunenberg lived at Caldwell, and explained that although he knew Thomas Hogan was Orchard, he took no steps immediately after the crime except to consult counsel for the Federation, because he was not an informer.

Copley asserted that he did not take Orchard seriously when they met in San Francisco, and Orchard told him of the Bradley crime.

British Iron Merger.

London, June 29.—A great combination of iron and steel manufacturers is being formed in Great Britain to combat American and German competition, control the British trade and dominate the steel industry of the world.

Nine big companies, headed by Vickers, Sons & Maxim, have absorbed 32 independent concerns, giving them control of 90 per cent. of steel produced in Great Britain.

The combined capital of the firms is over \$130,000,000.

TROOPS MASS ON FRONTIER.

Will Prevent Transmigration of Armenian Refugees.

Tiflis, Russia, June 29.—On account of the anarchical conditions of Bitlis, Turkish Armenia, where much fighting between Mussulmans and Armenians has occurred, the Russian troops on the Turkish frontier have been heavily strengthened, in order to prevent the transmigration of Armenian refugees, and a spread of the agitation to Russian territory, and also for the moral effect of the movement on the Turkish Government. A repetition of the big Armenian massacres of 1908, when thousands of Armenian refugees crossed the frontier and settled in Southern Caucasus, is feared. The Russian Government first encouraged the movement as a valuable industrial and civilizing factor, but later it felt obliged to prohibit immigration, asserting that the rapid occupation of Tartar lands by colonists was responsible for the Armenian-Tartar racial warfare, which has since periodically drenched Southern Caucasus with blood.

HAS A BAD RECORD.

Deposed Chicago Clergyman Suspected of Poisoning His Wife.

Chicago, June 29.—Walter Swincomb Hancock, who is under surveillance in London, suspected of poisoning his wife, was, during 1896 assistant rector of St. James' Episcopal Church, one of the leading churches of the denomination here, and was inhibited by the late Bishop McLaren upon charges preferred by Rev. James B. Stone, who is still rector of St. James' Church. Hancock came to Chicago from St. John's, Nfld., and investigations made there by Bishop McLaren showed him to have been a "man of evil repute." "The charges brought against Hancock here," said Mr. Stone Thursday night, "were that he was given to consorting with lewd women. They were never made public, but Bishop McLaren was convinced of his guilt. Being a British subject, Hancock could not be deported, and after his inhibition he dropped out of sight."

FOUR NEW PEERS CREATED.

Free Recognition of Art, Science and Literature.

London, June 29.—The list of the Kings' birthday honors, which usually are conferred as a reward of political and civil service, is more interesting than usual this year because of the recognition accorded art, science and literature. Four new peers have been named by the King, Sir James Kison, the former Lord Mayor of Leeds, a steel manufacturer; Sir James Blyth, who has devoted his wealth to the campaign against tuberculosis; Sir Samuel Montagu and Alexander Peckover, the two latter being bankers.

The new baronets include Sir William H. Holland, M. P. of Manchester, a cotton spinner; Sir Charles Scott, chairman of the London & Southwestern Railway, and Sir William P. Treloar, Lord Mayor of London.

More than thirty knighthoods have been bestowed, the recipients of this honor including William E. Cremer, M. P., the peace advocate; Dr. James Donaldson, principal of St. Andrews University; W. S. Gilbert, the playwright; Prof. Hubert von Herkomer, R. A.; W. Q. Orchardson, R. A., and Prof. John Rhys of Oxford.

OPIUM IN FRENCH NAVY.

Minister of Marine Demands Names of Officers Using Drug.

Paris, Friday, June 29.—The use of opium in the French navy has reached such proportions that M. Thomson, Minister of Marine, has sent out a circular, ordering that the names of officers showing evidences of the use of the drug be transmitted to him immediately. Officers are forbidden not only to smoke opium aboard the ships, but even to keep any objects that can be used for that purpose.

FOR FAMINE RELIEF.

Russian Imperial Ukase Authorizes Issue of Four Per Cent. Rentas.

St. Petersburg, June 29.—An Imperial ukase issued Thursday night directs M. Kokovsov, the Finance Minister, to issue \$25,000,000 in four per cent. rentas for purposes set forth in the budget, including famine relief.

The Council of Ministers has invested the commandants of all the Imperial palaces with exceptional powers.

TO VISIT AT WINDSOR.

Kaiser Will Be Guest of King In November Next.

London, June 29.—It is authoritative story that Emperor William and the Empress of Germany will visit King Edward and Queen Alexandra at Windsor in November.

Carried Off By Toy Balloons.

Chicago, June 29.—A despatch to The Record-Herald from Rockport, Texas, says: Minna, the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Moody of Waco was carried into the air Thursday by a bunch of toy balloons which an Italian peddler on the veranda of the hotel tied around her waist, thinking to please her. Before the spectators could recover from their surprise she was wafted out to sea, fifty feet in the air.

A launch occupied by George Munroe of Denver was in the bay, and he came to the little girl's rescue. Firing at the bundle of balloons which punctured several of them and she began to settle downward, finally landing safely twelve feet from the water on the shore of St. Joseph's Island.

What Is London's Doom?

With ominous hints of a German invasion and of an approaching earthquake the question, "What will be the doom of London?" seems a not unreasonable one. What will be the end of the great city? What will bring about its ruin over which Macaulay's New Zealander is to cast his moralizing eyes?

Several answers may be given. The destruction of London at the hands of a victorious invader is possible, but extremely improbable. London may be besieged, even bombarded; she cannot be destroyed.

Flood? This again may be dismissed as most improbable; and one calamity only remains to be considered, namely, Fire.

Now London has suffered more than once terribly from this cause, and in 1666 the city was practically wiped out.

Everyone knows this; but it is not everyone who knows that the great conflagration was predicted fifteen years before by Lily, the astrologer, and by another astrologer, Nostradamus, a century before that. Nostradamus cast his prediction in a French quatrain, the gist of which, was that in 1666 London would be visited by a conflagration which would destroy St. Paul's and eighty-nine other churches.

Object to Preference.

London, June 29.—(C.A.P.)—Twenty-two Unionist M.P.'s have issued a manifesto against colonial preference, which says that Canada, the colony that has made most advance in national importance, "being represented by a statesman," has dissociated herself from the demands of Australia and New Zealand.

Japan Suggests That Explosives Which Rot Should Be Used.

The Hague, June 29.—Various amendments have been presented to the British proposal, now before the sub-committee on maritime war of the peace conference, on the subject of submarine mines, all aimed at diminishing danger in the event of mines becoming derelict.

Japan suggests that only mines which are ineffective after a limited time be used, and Italy proposes that an apparatus be attached to floating mines making them ineffective an hour after they get afloat, and that fixed mines be rendered useless so soon as they break loose.
